### RESIGNATION OF GERMAN CABINET IN

more readily be solved through the medium of leaders than through parliamentary formulae.

They consented to observe a certain line of continuity so far as recognizing the present government's foreign policies was concerned, but declined to agree on any previous arrangements which tied the hands of German agents in connection with impending reparations negotiations. The nationalists prefaced their resolution with the statement that after mature deliberations they had decided not to put any barriers in the path of further negotiations with the middle parties.

The latter gave the reactionaries' pronouncements brief consideration and voted to make no reply to it, then adjourned in order to permit the Marx-Strasseman cabinet to go into executive session.

**Extremists Give Programme**

The extreme national members of the reichstag, number 32 met and formulated a remarkable programme, including the following demands:

First—Immediate election of a new president.

Second—Repeal of the law for protection of the republic.

Third—Assembly for all participants in the Munich and Kuesen-train revolts.

Fourth—Trial on the charge of treason of all who participated in the revolution of November, 1918, and collaborated with the soviet government.

Fifth—Expulsion of all Jews who have entered Germany since 1914, partial confiscation of their property and abolition of their right to change Jewish names.

Sixth—All Jews to be placed under special legislation.

General Ludendorff was not present.

The grange bill differs from the present income tax law in that it increases exemptions to conform to the federal law and relieves non-resident stockholders in local corporations from paying the tax. It was because of the latter provision in the present income tax act that it recently was attacked in the courts.

### Breeders of Holstein Cattle To Meet Next in Virginia

CHICAGO. (AP) — Seventy-nine Holstein cows have made yearly records of more than 1000 pounds of butterfat, and 54 cows of the same breed have in one year produced 20,000 pounds and more of milk. It will be shown in reports to be made at the convention of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America, to be held July 4 at Richmond, Virginia. In an announcement from headquarters here, made by President Frank O. Lowden, the business of the association for the last fiscal year shows an increase and a sound financial basis. "Although decreases in business were shown for the previous successive three years."

"Since 1885, when the association was organized, more than 1,200,000 cows and bulls have been registered in the Herd Book. Creditable records for production of milk and butterfat have been made by more than 100,000 cows under the supervision of agricultural colleges and recorded in the Advanced Registry."

A national sale of 120 purebred Holsteins will follow the meeting.
