### OLYMPIC TRIAL THIS WEEKEND

One Hundred and Twenty Athletes to Contest in Eugene on May 30 and 31.

**UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore. (Special).**—At least 120 of the best college, club and unattached athletes on the coast will gather in Eugene on May 30 and 31 for the Olympic trials, held in conjunction with the annual Pacific Coast conference track and field meet at the University of Oregon.

college, 14; Washington State college, 14; Idaho, 14; University of Oregon, 14; Stanford, 14; Multnomah club, 14; Pacific university, 6; College of Puget Sound, 1; Chemawa, 2; University of Montana, 5.

Besides these, there are nine unattached entries from various parts of the northwest. Men who distinguish themselves in the Eugene trials will be sent to Boston where the national trials will be held on June 15. Men who excel there will be sent to Paris to represent the United States in the Olympic games.

At the Eugene meet the contestants will enter the 100, 200, 240 and 330 yard dashes. Other men will contest in the mile, two mile, 5,000 and 10,000 meter run. Other events, scheduled for the Olympic trials and the coast conference meet, are the pole vault, javelin and discus throwing, pentathlon, decathlon, 3,000 meters steeplechase, 10,000 meter cross country run, 1200 and 200 hurdles, a 10,000 meter walk, running high and broad jumps, shot put and hammer throw.

A special round-trip rate of fare and a half has been granted to all persons attending the Olympic trials from points in Oregon, Washington and Idaho, providing 150 or more travel by rail. Those coming to Eugene should purchase full fare one-way tickets and request ticket agent to give them certificate receipts. These receipts when properly validated at Eugene, will entitle the holder to purchase tickets for their return trip from Eugene to their original starting point at half fare.

### 755 Athletes Entered For National Tourney

**CHICAGO (AP).**—Seven hundred and fifty-five athletes will compete in the national interscholastic track and field tournament at the University of Chicago Friday and Saturday, it was announced Monday. There will be 623 men from 154 high schools and in the academy division, 132 athletes from academics in Illinois, Indiana, Oklahoma, Minnesota, Texas, Missouri and Wisconsin.

Twenty-three states will be represented. The State High School association of Utah telegraphed the entry of 10 men and a relay team among the late entries, and the Utah representation is expected to make a strong bid for scoring honors. Among the Utah men will be V. Johnson, who leaped six feet two inches in the high jump at his state meet; J. Burke, a 4:30 miler, and W. Bern, who shotput 45 feet.

### CHANCE IS UNLIKELY TO RUN CHICAGO WHITE SOX

**CHICAGO, (INS).**—It is unlikely Frank Chance ever will take over the management of the White Sox. There are three big reasons. One is that Chance is a sick man and may not be well enough to assume

so arduous a task as leadership of a big league ball club.

The second reason is that if he recovers his doctors may rule against his leaving California, because any other climate might bring a relapse.

The most important reason, however, is that Johnny Evers is doing so well as getting manager that it would size up as folly to make a shift in club leadership at this time. Evers took a seeming fall-and-aggregation south and ever since the season began has had it fighting it out with leaders for supremacy of the American League.

No man can do more than Evers has done—and perhaps none could do half so well. So it looks as if Evers will be using manager thru 1924 and manager in 1925.

### Pierce Gets Protests

**SALEM, Ore.**—Many telegrams have been received at the executive department from California protesting against the recent action of Governor Pierce in refusing to allow the Oregon national guard to go into summer training at Monterey. The order was issued, the governor said, because of the prevalence of the foot and mouth disease in California.

Adjutant-General White said today that the guardsmen probably would be sent to Camp Lewis. The adjutant-general has favored the proposal to send the troops to Georgetown, but this plan apparently was not acceptable to the federal officers with headquarters at San Francisco.

## GEORGES WILL MEET GIBBONS

**MICHIGAN CITY, Ind. (By the Associated Press).**—Georges Carpenter, resuming work Tuesday, after a two-day layoff, convinced the boxing experts that he is ready to meet Tom Gibbons in their 10-round international boxing contest here next Saturday afternoon.

The French light heavyweight, knowing that his every move was being checked up by the critics, worked with the speed of a light-weight. He whipped his punches over with the precision of a sharpshooter and was obliged to heed the warnings of Trainer Gus Wilson, who was standing outside the ring continually shouting to Carpenter to keep his low in check.

Carpenter worked an equivalent of nine rounds. He boxed five rounds with two sparring partners, shadow boxed for a round, waded the heavy bag for a round and went through a round of calisthenics before an attack on the light bag.

**NEW RECORD SET.**  
**URBANA, Ill. (AP).**—Harold M. Osborne, ex-University of Illinois athlete, at present member of the Illinois Athletic club, broke the world's high jump record in preliminary Olympic trials held Tuesday by Illinois athletes here. His leap of 6 feet 8 1/2 inches supercedes a mark of 6 feet 7 1/2 inches set by Ed Beeson, of the Olympic club, San Francisco, July 2, 1914.

## BISHOP TRIAL IN SPOTLIGHT

of its case the prosecution would present a book of common prayer from cover to cover.

**CLEVELAND (INS).**—History rolled back its musty pages for centuries here in Cleveland Tuesday as a bishop of the Protestant Episcopal church, William Montgomery Brown, silver haired and feeble from his 46 odd years of teaching the Word, went on trial before a jury of his peers, charged with being a heretic and an atheist.

It is the first jury trial in the Episcopal church since the Reformation, and as such holds the undivided interest of all churchmen, irrespective of creeds. If Bishop Brown has his way, his trial will be an epochal one in the Christian religion. Before it ends he means to compel, if possible, his fellow bishops and judges to write a new definition of heresy and to defend their own orthodoxy by giving the world their personal beliefs in such matters as the start of creation, the divinity of Christ and other miscellaneous stories set forth in both old and new Testaments.

**Basis of Defense.**  
Bishop Brown bases his defense on two major principles:  
1. That the court of nine bishops is powerless to try or condemn him, a retired bishop, under canonical law; and,  
2. That his alleged errors of doctrine in his book, "Communism and Christianity" are simply his interpretation of the scripture symbolically instead of literally.

It is no clash of the modernists and the fundamentalists, this trial of Bishop Brown. The modernists question only the literalness of the virgin birth and such kindred questions. Bishop Brown goes further, much further. He does not believe that Christ ever existed; he does not believe that God made the world, as set forth in Genesis; he does not believe there is or ever was a God in the conscious, personal sense—rather, he accepts it all as purely symbolical.

**Loves Christ as Symbol.**  
"I do not believe there ever was such a man as Santa Claus," he said today with simple directness. "Yet, I believe in and admire the spirit of Santa Claus. He is a beautiful symbol of goodness, kindness and charity. So with Christ. I do not believe he existed. Yet I do believe in the symbolism of Christ and that Christianity stands for goodness and kindness. It is a beautiful thing."

Bishop Brown styles himself a "rationalist" in religion, as differentiated from "modernist" and "fundamentalist."  
"There is no rational doubt," he says, "about the fictitious character of the living Jesus."  
"My God, nature, is a sublime divinity—matter being the father, force, the son, and motion the spirit."

**Loses Faith in Future.**  
"I have come to disbelieve in the existence of a conscious personal divinity. Of course, my faith in the existence of a spiritual world and hope for future life in it went with me."  
"If you ask me whether I am still a professing Christian, I shall answer:  
"Yes; yet the brother of Jesus is not for me an historic person."

## Cement Foundations to Be Silver Sprinkled

**LAKEVIEW, Idaho (AP).**—Cement foundations now under construction on the property of the Hewer mine for use as machinery bases will contain more than 1200 ounces of silver besides the ordinary ingredients when completed, according to Harry Hewer, superintendent of the mine. Eighty tons of sand, running about 17 ounces of silver to the ton, is being utilized from the mine dump in preference to hauling other sand a distance of five miles.

According to Mr. Hewer, using sand from the mine dump was considered cheaper.

This amount of metal after examination would be worth approximately \$500 at the current quotations for bar silver.
