

# MONUMENT TO HONOR HEROES

"Americans Lost at Sea" to Be Remembered by National Marker on Potomac.

WASHINGTON (AP)—A new shrine to American valor at sea is to take its place soon among the monuments and memorials here in the nation's capital to the great dead of America. Wrought in bronze, it will stand at the brink of the peaceful Potomac that the river may bear with it to the sea a message of remembrance to those who have gone down to the sea in ships for the flag, whether in ships of war or plodding merchantmen, never to return.

It will be a national monument to those through all the years who have served in the navy and merchant marine on the sea, and it will be dedicated to "America's Lost at Sea."

Across the wide river, high among the rolling Virginia hills, are the towering monuments and shafts of Arlington National cemetery where many who died heroic deaths rest amid their military honors.

But the new tribute to the valor of those who have died at sea in war or in peace will stand close down beside the river with the quiet waters lapping it as they pass on to join the sea beyond the Virginia capes. It will be built by popular subscription to cost \$100,000 or more and already the site has been set aside.

by law and the form of the memorial itself has been decided by the members of the committee who are, for the most part, men who have served America on the waters all around the world.

The spirit in which this new sister of patriotism has been conceived is told by Rear Admiral Bradley A. Pliske (retired), chairman of the committee in charge of its erection.

"There is no such monument anywhere in the world," Admiral Pliske said.

"There is no monument that attracts any appreciation by men and women of the dangers which they have achieved. There is no visible reminder of our debt to the men of the sea for assuring that safe passage of the sea which has welded widely separated countries into a coherent world.

"Though monuments to military commanders adorn selected spots in all the civilized countries of the earth, only a few monuments to naval men exist, and virtually all of these commemorate war achievements only. The long and hazardous voyages of merchant seamen who made the ocean safe for commerce and spread civilization over the earth, though told in song and story, have never received the recognition which all men know to be the highest; that of an enduring monument, erected on some exalted spot, where it can be seen by men.

"Such a tribute it is the intent of the Navy and Marine Memorial association to render the men of the sea; but it will memorialize, as well, those from whom the epic sea sacrifice was not required but who heaved the same dangers as those from whom it was required, and stood equally ready to make it. It says that the countless millions who have profited by their work that they must not forget that work, or neglect the men who did it.

"So, while this monument symbolizes the grandeur of the sea, it powerfully suggests the grandeur of the seaman's art, which has made a conquest of the sea and marked a myriad of paths across its foaming waters. And it calls upon every one to visualize what seamen have done for him, and to pay a rightful tribute to those who, through all the dim centuries of the distant past, have gone down to the sea in ships, and have done their business in great waters."

Associated with Admiral Pliske on the executive committee are: Walter F. Pirth, treasurer; William Pelletier Morgan, Jr., secretary; Anna M. Graham, Colonel Robert M. Thompson, Colonel Edward A. Simpson, Ray C. Shepherd and Herbert N. Davison, headquarters of the committee being New York City. The honorary national committee is headed by Secretary Wilbur of the navy department as chairman, and includes Assistant Secretary Theodore Roosevelt, Admiral Leigh C. Palmer, President of the Emergency Fleet corporation, Major General John A. Lajeune, of the marine corps, and Rear Admiral William S. Benson, U. S. N., retired, of the shipping board.

The national committee includes Admirals Eberie and Coontz and Rear Admirals Wilson, Jones, Pinkett, Josephthal, De Steyer, Seales and Welles and numerous others of the navy as well as civilians interested in naval or merchant marine matters. The women's committee is headed by Mrs. Edwin Denby, wife of the former secretary of the navy, and includes the wives of many naval and merchant marine officials as well as Mrs. Nicholas Longworth, wife of Representative Longworth, house majority leader.

Cross Men Nominated. MARSHFIELD, Ore.—Seven republicans in Cross county received the democratic nominations for county offices in the recent primaries. Judge C. H. Wade was nominated for district circuit judge on the democratic ticket, although he did not seek the nomination. Those who received both nominations were: Charles Hall, senator; Dal M. King, representative; B. P. Pierce, joint representative; Matt Klockars, commissioner; Tom Dtmick, treasurer, and J. P. Beyers, assessor.

The only echo of this election is heard in the possibility that Judge Wade of Bandon will be groomed to accept and run for senator against Charles Hall, but this is not likely, as Judge Wade once refused the nomination.

## Making Money in U. S. Ascribed to the Joy Of Success by Kelman

LONDON (AP)—Returning to London after five years pastorate at Fifth Avenue Presbyterian church, Doctor J. Kelman told reporters that he and his wife had received wonderful kindness at the hands of the American people. As a nation Americans enjoyed the game of life tremendously. Although the gaining of money in business or by any other legitimate means, was the common interest of Americans, it mostly arose from the joy of success. During the whole of this time he was there he had not met a miserly American.

"The Americans are a practical, scientific people," continued Dr. Kelman, "and meet the dangers of their highly crowded and highly strung life in New York by scientific relaxation. The business men of America recognize the dangers to health and efficiency that civilization has brought, and are avoiding or combatting them. The American citizen practically lives under a more or less permanent system of training to keep himself fit for his job."
