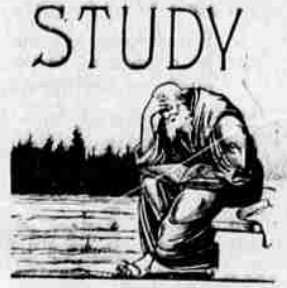

NEW ELECTRIC POWER PLANT ALMOST READY NEAR RIO DE JANEIRO

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP)—What is said to be the largest hydro-electric power development in South America is now nearing completion on the Paralyba river near this city. For more than two years an organization of about 2000 men, under the direction of a staff of American engineers and construction men, has been building dams, canals, power-house, and transmission lines which will generate and distribute 152,000 electric horse-power over a large zone in this part of Brazil. It is expected that the new plant will be in operation by June of this year.

BANDITRY IS BLOSSOMING

Miscreants Busy in Manchuria with Advent of Summer; Depredations Begin.

HARBIN, Manchuria (AP)—The notorious bandits of Manchuria, called in Chinese "Huntz" or "Hsiangz", have begun to reappear with the advent of warm weather. Their favorite field of operations is along the 900-mile line of the Chinese Eastern railway, among the prosperous settlements populated by Russian railway employes and Chinese farmers.

The cold of the winter serves to keep these bandits more or less quiescent, maintaining themselves as best they can on booty acquired during the summer season. Nevertheless, they do not find it necessary to hide in the mountains or forests during their period of inactivity. On the contrary they mingle freely in the life of the towns as peaceable citizens, sometimes occupying themselves with some petty trade, or begging in the streets.

Occasionally one chance to be recognized, in which case punishment is swift and sure at the hand of an executioner who wields a two-handed sword, or in a locality dominated by the military, before a firing squad. In either case the occasion is public.

The severity of their punishment when caught suggests the fear with which the populace regards the bandits, and there is plenty of reason for this. In the summer they actually terrorize the railway towns, levy taxes on the lumber concessionaires, fight battles with the troops and are too often successful, and interrupt navigation on the rivers. They operate in well armed detachments of bands and thus far opposition to them has met with doubtful success. Railway guards exist but are poorly armed and poorly organized, so that railway employes living along the line are resigning their posts and moving to places of safety.

Work in the lumber concessions has been interrupted in the summer because of frequent attacks, capture of employes, heavy taxes and forest fires of suspected origin. Steamers and junks on the river are occasionally fired at, boarded and plundered.

No remedy is as yet even suggested. Troops have been used against the bandits but never in sufficient numbers to accomplish anything, and in the opinion of observers they never will be exterminated by force of arms so long as present political conditions continue.

Salmon Catch Light.
ASTORIA, Ore.—About the only change in the fishing situation is that the salmon taken averaged larger in size than those caught during the last week. This catch, however, continues light, a few of the boats making hauls of from 500 pounds each, while others get practically nothing.

LONDON (INS)—There is no longer any such thing as "the style" in women's clothes. Instead there are as many different modes of clothes as there are kinds of women. Any woman who is wearing clothes that are adapted to her own personality is in style.

These are the views of Paul Poiret, famous French creator of clothes and arbiter of feminine styles the world over. Poiret has recently been in London exhibiting his latest creations to the elite of fashionable English society.

"There is no excuse now for any woman who has good taste to be unbecomingly dressed," Poiret said. "There was a time when every woman had to wear a certain kind of clothes regardless of whether she looked well in them, or she was regarded as hopelessly out of style. Thus women wore short skirts even if they made them look ridiculous, or a sleeveless gown no matter how ugly their arms might be."

"All this is changed now, and the successful modiste designs clothes to suit the type and personality of her customer. The result is that women everywhere are more becomingly dressed than they ever have been, for they wear the clothes that suit them, and the modistes cooperate with them in producing dresses that are becoming."
