Lewiston, Pendleton, Baker, Walla Walla and La Grande will compete in an 18 hole tournament for several prizes which have been offered by the Walla Walla club.

The La Grande country club is sending twelve men, a round dozen of her best golfers to compete. Most of the boys are in top form now and better than at any time in a season. There's to be favorable weather which has allowed more practice than is usual this time of year. The only difficulty will be the playing on the turf greens and fairways to which the local golfers are unaccustomed. Turf greens are considered slower than sand greens and thus present a danger of over-putting.

Rumania May Regulate Strong Drink Trade

BUCHAREST (AP)—The idea of prohibition, at least in a mild form, apparently is beginning to take root in Rumania.

Vintila Bratiano, minister of finance and brother to the Rumanian premier has appointed a commission to assist in drafting legislation designed to curtail and regulate the sale and consumption of strong spirits, particularly "trouza," a native brandy.

It is not planned to interfere with light wines and beer. The habit of drinking these beverages is so deep-rooted that interference probably would be considered unwise by any Rumanian government.

The main purpose of the proposed legislation is to restrict the diversion of food products from nutritive purposes to that of manufacturing liquors of high alcoholic content. It is proposed to make it illegal for producers of foodstuffs to sell more than a small portion

ELDERBLOOM CLUB GROWS

SPokane, Wash. (AP)—Ten years ago the Elderbloom club, a social organization for elderly folk, was founded in Seattle by Mrs. America L. King, who had conceived the idea of bringing together men and women who had passed life's 50th milestone for mutual entertainment. The organization was launched with a charter membership of 25, representing 25 states and four foreign countries.

Today the Seattle club alone has a membership of 700, the Spokane club more than 500 members, and Mrs. King, now a resident of Spokane, has seen the little club she

founded grow into an organization of national prominence. The movement has spread widely throughout the United States and the membership runs into thousands.

Elderbloom club members pay no dues and there is no initiation fee. The Spokane club holds meetings once each month when a short program is given.

Principal functions of the club are to provide something of interest in the lives of members without class home ties, to visit members who are confined by age or

physical disability and to perform other services of similar nature.

DISEASE GERMS FLOURISH IN GERMAN PAPER MONEY
BERLIN (AP)—Disease germs are more prevalent among post-war bank notes in Germany than they were in the paper money in use before the war. Investigators have found, because of the fact that the currency is handled more frequently than prior to 1914. This because there is less of it. Investigators in Berlin have

found that coined money is virtually innocuous, owing to the self-disinfecting action of the metal itself, and because its small smooth surface prevents development of the germs. "The dirtiest piece of copper or silver is, from the standpoint of a bacteriologist, better than newly-issued paper money," says the report.
