AUTO RACING MARKS BROKEN

Ninety-Eight Miles Per Hour Is Made by Winner of the Indianapolis Classic.

INDIANAPOLIS (By the Associated Press)—The annual 500-mile race of the Indianapolis motor speedway Friday produced record-breaking times for the great gasoline classic and also brought honors to two race drivers, Joe Boyer of Detroit and L. L. Corum of Indianapolis.

Fourth to First Place. Boyer, who retired when his own car developed trouble, piloted the winning machine over the last 222 miles. Boyer and Corum were teammates driving Indianapolis made cars.

Setting a terrific pace in the winning machine, Boyer moved up from fourth place and after a speed duel took the lead from Earl Cooper at 445 miles and held it until finish. Cooper finished second, 1274 minutes behind the leader and Jimmie Murphy winner in 1922, eased in third place nearly 3 minutes later.

His voice, too, is powerful and with a carrying quality that can reach the most remote corner even of Cleveland's great auditorium.

Next to Borah, consideration of the nominating speechmaker has centered chiefly around Albert J. Beveridge, of Indiana.

Beveridge, too, carries some of the aura of a progressive, through his adherence to Roosevelt in 1912. He is also, a good orator. He has perhaps greater eloquence, but less force, than Borah.

But Indiana Republican politics are so scrambled this year that the advantage to the Coolidge
