THE WATER PROBLEM

From the jumble of wild rumors that have been afloat in regard to Beaver creek water situation it is almost impossible to get any idea of the water supply or the method of delivering it to La Grande. The Beaver creek watershed which is a source of supply covers an area of 100 square miles, mostly covered with timber and underbrush, and in many places having a very porous surface which allows the surface water to readily pass down to bed rock and only to reappear at some other place in the form of springs but only for a short distance and again sink into the loose formation. This condition no doubt is largely responsible for the difference of opinion of people who are more or less familiar with this section of the country. Many who have hunted, fished and "rode" over this area tell of the great number of springs and the quantity of fine water they flow, while others who seem to have had about the same amount of experience in the same localities insist that no such thing exists. This source of information is seemingly so inaccurate that it is of little value in getting at the real facts so we must turn our attention to what little engineering information that we have and the opinions of the men who have had the care and maintenance of the Beaver creek project in the past years.

The only engineering data I have been able to get so far relative to the water supply is found in the report of Stevens & Coon (a copy of which may be seen at the office of the city manager), a consulting engineers, of Portland, Oregon, employed by the city of La Grande during the summer of 1921 to look over the feasibility of securing a new pipe line of sufficient size to meet our requirements would be in place.

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criticism seems to be a very poorly constructed piece of work and needs considerable amount of patching up to make it water tight but in the opinion of City Manager Hayes there is no danger of going out.

In the opinion of consulting engineers (Messrs. Stevens and Coon) and the men who have recently been at work repairing this line, several stretches of the line require relaying. The estimated cost of which was furnished by Stevens and Coon and is as follows:

As this report was furnished under date of September 21, 1921, there may be some variance as to cost of labor and material at the present time and as to amount of material needed.

It is thought by those who are familiar with the pipe line conditions that their estimate covers more pipe than is really needed to be relayed. It is also thought advisable by those familiar with the situation to relay all pipe of a larger size and by continuing this from time to time as new pipe is laid it would be but a few years until a new pipe line of sufficient size to meet our requirements would be in place.

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
