WOULD EXTEND RUM TRAFFIC

Bahamans Making Money by Trading in Liquor Since America Went Dry.

WASHINGTON (AP).—The fluctuations of the financial fortunes of the governments of neighboring British colonies, for instance of the Bahamas Islands, lifted from debt to prosperity since the United States went dry, and of the Bermuda Islands, which have won from the Bahamans much profitable business in exporting liquor to the American coast, is being watched with interest by the prohibition enforcement officers here of the government.

Bermuda now has a handsome surplus in its treasury.

The latest development in the Bahamas, a move to start a distillery to manufacture American rye whiskey, all stocks of which, as far as the bootlegging business is concerned, has come to the attention of prohibition officers. In the Bahamas assembly W. K. Moore recently moved the appointment of a select committee to inquire into and report on the working of the spirits and beer manufacturers' act of 1923. Speaking to the motion, Mr. Moore told his fellow legislators that opportunities were coming to their island. The Bahamas, he declared had encouraged the liquor traffic, but there was no American rye whiskey available, the enormous supplies exported from the United States to those islands before prohibition having been exhausted by the bootlegging business in the four years since then.

Persons interested in the distillery, Mr. Moore stated, believed the manufacture of rye whiskey and its export to the American coast would be the means of re-suscitating the island's rum ringle trade and add to Bahama's revenue, now at low ebb because such of the rum running business was being conducted from Bermuda. A committee of seven members was appointed to report on the working of the spirits and beer manufacturers' act.

Speaking of the proposed rye whiskey distillery, a Bahama newspaper remarks that if the Bahamans can supply the unsatisfied demand for rye whiskey, the colony may once again have a monopoly and attract business with a revenue of \$3 for each proof gallon distilled. Also it may again be able to insist that buyers take Scotch along with the rye. If this happens the paper suggests that the duty on imported whiskey be raised to \$60 again, and kept there.

A year ago the tariff on liquor was reduced from \$6 to \$3 a case in order to stop the decline in the traffic. Through the reduction it is claimed the colony lost more than \$50,000 in revenue. A proposal now before the legislature calls for a further reduction to \$1 a case.

L. W. Young, member of the assembly and one of those strongly favoring reduction of the duties said that when the members of the House realized how much the liquor business had changed the internal affairs of the colony, civic, social and almost religious, it was time they should consider very seriously how they would dispose of the question. Not only had there been an increase in the number of employees and salaries in the colony's civil establishment

A report to the assembly recently indicated that had it not been for the heavy receipts from liquor import duties, the colony, during the last fiscal year, would have faced a deficit.

FAIRBANKS, Alaska. (AP).—Carl B. Etelson, the air postman flying between this city and McGrath, Alaska, a distance of 350 miles, is one of the best paid men in the aerial mail service, according to the local postmaster.

Etelson receives \$2 a mile or about \$200 an hour. The government furnishes the plane and pays for repairs. Etelson purchases the gasoline and oil and provides the field and hangar. He made his first flight in 1917 at Riverside, Cal., while a cadet in the army air service.

SOFTWOOD IS SHOWING GAIN

Improvement in Lumber Market Noted During Past Week Excepting in Hardwood Trade.

Some improvement in the softwood lumber market has been noted during the last week, and the tone is distinctly stronger, says the American Lumberman, Chicago. Bookings by southern pine mills have shown progressive growth during recent weeks, and have lately exceeded production for the first time in four months. While southern pine prices are still low, they have shown no addition declines of any consequence in the last ten days. The same is true of Douglas fir prices which, after precipitate drops, now appear to have struck bottom. An upward reaction at any time is expected by west coast manufacturers, who report a steady, though slow, expansion in domestic demand. These also report a brighter export outlook. Lumber stocks in Japan are said to have been reduced to a surprising extent, so a resumption of buying from that source is expected, especially as the season is now at hand when Japanese exports normally increase and thereby enhance the value of the yen. Other export fields also show unmistakable interest in the fir market, and it is likely that July 1 will find a vastly changed condition in this branch of the trade.

The hardwood market has shown little change, consuming interests still buying with extreme caution

and in some cases having curtailed their output. The outlook, however, is not entirely discouraging, and hardwood manufacturers continue to take a cheerful view of the situation. Southern species have shown some further slight price declines, but northern woods occupy virtually the same position as heretofore. The scarcity of the latter remains acute, and the limited quantities of the new cut that are reaching marketable state are moving out on old orders.
