

AUTO DRIVERS GIVEN RULES

Asked to Shun New York Streets During Coming Democratic National Convention.

NEW YORK, (AP)—Traffic congestion in Manhattan is so chronic that an appeal to "Please Park Your Car Outside" is being broadcast to the thousands of motorists who are expected to motor here during the National Democratic Convention.

There are normally 350,000 motor vehicles in New York City and enough horse-drawn trucks and carriages to fill the city to nearly a half million. With thousands of electric street cars operating with superstructures of elevated railroads narrowing some streets and with most of the city's 6,000,000 population constantly going somewhere about, traffic is congested despite a rigid system of police control.

Convention officials estimate that at least 200,000 persons will come to New York for the convention by train, by boat, by automobile and even by airplane. "This number does not, however, include 50,000 persons who, it is estimated, will come to and from the city from within a radius of 50 or 100 miles during the convention."

"Our appeal," said Stanley J. Quinn, directing vice-president of the local non-partisan National Convention Committee, "is aimed at those commuters and the tourists who will motor from long distances to remain in the metropolis throughout the convention. It will be absolutely imperative for them to find parking space or garage room within easy walking distance of the Madison Square Garden auditorium, for that matter, anywhere in central Manhattan."

"To the automobile clubs, transit companies, police and convention committees have been issued in this park 'Yellow Car Outside' campaign. We want the tourists to come but we want to make things pleasant for them when they arrive."

"All motorists from within communicating distance are being urged to park their cars near rapid-transit terminals in the residential sections, where they can ride by subway, elevated or bus directly to Madison Square Park, quickly and cheaply."

Motorists from afar are asked also to park in the outskirts, either in the areas of rapid-transit terminals over which automobile associations and police with stand guard, or in the numerous garages in the suburbs. Various agencies are working with garage owners toward establishing a fair price system of storage and repair charges, so that there be no gouging.

FRUIT YIELD MAY BE SHORT

ELGIN, Ore. (Special to the Observer)—H. L. Weatherpoon, who constantly keeps in touch with the fruit and market and fruit conditions generally throughout the country, recently returned from a trip to Idaho where he spent several days looking over fruit conditions.

From reliable reports at hand, Mr. Weatherpoon is of the opinion that the apple crop of the three states (Oregon, Idaho and Washington), will be only about 53 and 1-2 per cent of what it was last season. The early freeze very materially damaged practically all of the fruit growing sections of these states. The softer fruits suffered greater damage than apples, much of it being killed entirely.

Mr. Weatherpoon is confident that the local crop has passed the danger point, and even though the dry weather continues it will not materially reduce the yield. This locality was fortunate in that the apple crop was not advanced sufficiently to be affected by the cold snap that caught other sections of the state where the trees had bled or were in bloom. Though the fruit crop of this region is far in advance of what it usually is at this season of the year, yet our higher altitude is responsible for the escape of the apple crop from the early freeze that damaged other sections of the state. Their misfortune is our gain, as the crop shortage will mean a better market at higher prices and this section will profit with its full crop of apples.

STUDENT REPAYS COLLEGE COST OF EDUCATING HIM

CAMBRIDGE, (AP)—Should a college student pay the full cost of his education when it is demonstrated that it cost the institution more money than he has paid in tuition fees? There is one senior at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology who thinks so, and he has backed up his belief by sending the institute a check for \$1,622.50. His name is withheld.

Impressed by a suggestion made some months ago by Gerard Swane, president of the General Electric company and a member of the Technology corporation, that the tuition be raised to cover the full cost of education, the student asked the bursar to figure out the actual costs. The bursar complied and in a letter accompanying his check the student wrote:

"In other words," Dean Roberts said, "we have traveled a long distance from the attitude of our savage ancestors. rejoice in our material progress we have a clearer vision than ever before of its limits." He cautioned, however, that pride over physical development accomplished, "must be tempered by a humility that we have so far failed to use it for the highest ends."

The development of a manhood to guide and control these forces to useful ends in the task facing civilization, Dean Roberts asserted, adding that "in this task education and religion must join hands." "An education that views the universe in a dead, cold, mechanical way, and a religion that cannot become

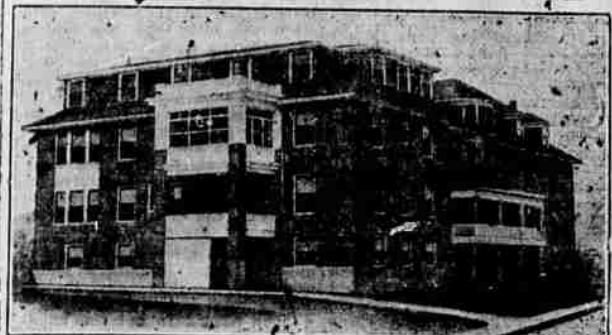
