ENTRANTS TO
COMPETE SOON

Olympic Swimming Final
Tryouts Will Be
Held in Indianapolis
June 5, 6 and 7.

INDIANAPOLIS (AP).—Win-
ners and second place men in the
Olympic final tryouts here June 5,
6 and 7, will compose the United
States swimming team at the Paris
games in July. Following the try-
outs the team members will join
the track and field squad at New
York for the trip overseas.

The course laid out in the Broad
River pool here in a duplicate of
the 50-meter pool at Paris. Spe-
cial diving boards similar to those
which will be used overseas also
have been constructed.

Charles J. Lynch of Detroit has
been selected by Director Paul
Jordan as referee. John T. Taylor
of Pittsburgh, chairman of the
Olympic swimming selection com-
mittee, will be starter. Judges of
diving include Clarence Lynch, Leo
Hogan of Chicago, James A. Tay-
lor of Columbus, and J. P. Nih of
New York.

More than 200 entrants, includ-
ing teams from Hawaii, the Pacific
coast, New York, New Orleans,
Chicago, Detroit and other centers
will participate in the nine events.

It will be the first Olympic final
tryouts for John Weissmuller, Chi-
cago, world's greatest swimmer,
Duke Kahanamoku and his brother
Sam, together with Warren Kelsola,
Hawaiian star, and "Buddy"
Sullivan, the New Orleans champion.

DISABLED VETERANS
TO MEET IN GREAT
MORMON TABERNALE

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah (AP).—
The famous Mormon Tabernacle
will be the scene of the fourth an-
nual convention of the Disabled
American Veterans of the World
War, to be held here June 23
to 25.

The great tabernacle will be
brilliantly decorated for the oc-
casion. A special section will be
reserved for Gold Star mothers,
with places for other war organ-
izations. A radio broadcaster will
reach all sections of the North
American continent with excerpts
from the addresses and musical
program. The tabernacle organ,
ranked by the 25th Infantry
band, will provide the musical
background. Madame Schumann-
Heink, friend of the veterans will
sing "The Star Spangled Banner."
Organizations assisting in the
convention will include the Ameri-
can Legion, Veterans of Foreign
Wars, Spanish War Veterans,
Grand Army of the Republic,
United Confederate Veterans, the
Service Star Legion, the Red Cross
and the Knights of Columbus.

Portugal Will Be at Paris

LISBON (AP).—Portugal will
send a small but highly selected
representation to the Olympic
games in Paris. A government
appropriation has been sup-
plied by private donations, and
the teams are now in training.
Fencing is given first place in
Portugal's hopes, but swimming,
rowing, wrestling, discus throw-
ing and weight lifting carries also
will be made, and a rifle team se-
lected from among her many good
marksmen.

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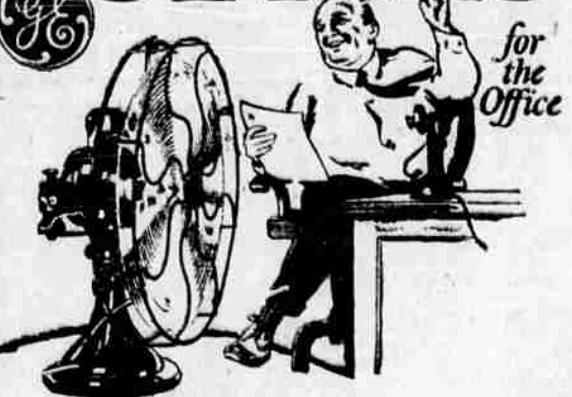
