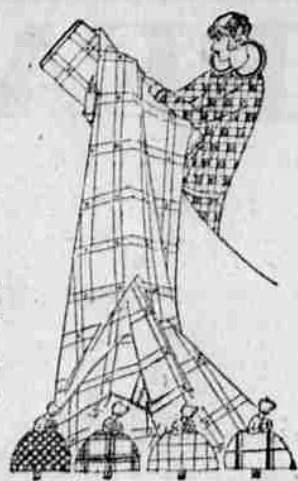




Four Little Maidens In A Row

DERBY FOUNDER WINS

DERBY'S COLT IS TRIUMPHANT

"San Sovino" Waltzes in Winner in the Great Epsom Downs Classic Today.

EPSON DOWNS (By the Associated Press).—The Derby colt "San Sovino" won the first time in 127 years bringing triumph to Epsom Downs to the family which founded the famous race in 1780.

Yank Sailors Eager For Sport Proficiency

SAN PEDRO, Calif. (AP).—The value of an athletic personnel, always recognized by military organizations, now is receiving more attention than ever in the Pacific battle fleet.

Each battleship of the fleet now has, in the course of a year, more than 200 men on various teams and crews, and it is all part of the official routine. A schedule is carried out to determine the fleet championship in each event.

But boxing is most popular with the troops, and each ship is required to develop 15 boat crews a year. A strenuous training period of several months is necessary for boat crews. Ten years ago boxing and wrestling were by far the most popular navy sports, but in late years other sports have come to the front.

Today the fleet is represented in at least ten major sports—boxing, wrestling, football, baseball, track, soccer, rowing, rifle, swimming and water polo. Basketball is not absent. Lacrosse is just entering and making a strong bid for popularity.

Many obstacles confront the sailor athletes. They have no gymnasium and lack equipment and their hours are irregular. Yet they manage to make an excellent showing in every sport.

SHIPMENTS OF LUMBER GIVEN FOREIGN TRADE CAUCUS OPENS

Exports for May Amount to Less Than During Same Month Last Year

PORTLAND, Ore. (Special).—Lumber exports for May 1924 amounted to 17,436,543 feet with a value of \$474,117. This is the first time this year that lumber exports have been less than for the same month in 1923. This, however, is accounted for by the small shipments of lumber, destined to Japan, which amounted to only 3,731,543 feet for May this year compared with 14,000,000 feet for the same month in 1923.

Shipments to South and Central American ports were heavy during this month with 2,005,600 feet delivered in Chile, 1,875,000 feet in Peru, 61,050 Salvador, 50,000 Brazil, 26,484 Uruguay, and 13,200 Argentina.

China again assumed the position of our largest receiver of lumber taking 5,229,533 feet. China has been a very steady buyer during this year, taking between five and fifteen million feet each month. This, also, is the smallest record for deliveries to this country so far this year.

Australia and New Zealand are taking more Northern lumber, and during the month of May 2,053,914 feet of lumber valued at \$66,846 were shipped to these countries. To the Philippines were shipped 362,549 feet during this month. Shipments to the United Kingdom were heavier than usual with 1,564,165 feet valued at \$71,773. Other shipments to Europe include 50,000 feet to Holland.

Domestic shipments of lumber for the month of May 1924 amounted to 30,214,725 feet of which 9,322,046 feet are to be delivered in New York City.

Intercoastal shipments of lumber have been very heavy this year and the record for the five months surpasses that of the entire year in 1923. Shipments to New York have been particularly heavy, but small shipments have been made to most of the Eastern and Gulf ports. During the month of May this year shipments outside of those to New York were made to Baltimore, Boston, Philadelphia, Norfolk, New Orleans, Mobile, Houston and Galveston. This lumber was carried by 12 vessels, with 15 vessels carrying cargoes to California ports.

According to the reports issued by the Deputy Collector of Customs at Astoria, the total shipments from the Columbia River in May amount to a little more than 52,000,000 feet. During this month 22 vessels cleared from the river with lumber for foreign and domestic ports. Of this 52,000,000-foot 16,000,000 were destined for foreign ports, 21,000,000 feet to California, and 15,000,000 to Atlantic Coast ports. These figures consider vessels which cleared from Astoria during the month, but do not take in those several vessels which cleared from Portland on the last day of May. This accounts for the difference in figures on the two reports.

BOSTON (By the Associated Press).—The need for an immediate solution of the problem of securing a career for young Americans in the foreign trade field was emphasized at the Eleventh National Foreign Trade convention, during the session this afternoon on Education for Foreign Trade, by Eugene Van Clee, chairman of the foreign trade division of the College of Commerce and Journalism of the Ohio State University.

Mr. Van Clee said: "Either business men of the United States wish the universities to train men in preparation for the foreign field, or they do not."

"Should we offer a single course of 48 months in the general field of foreign trade as merely a cultural course for those training for domestic business, or should we offer a full four-year curriculum, as some of us are now doing, in the belief that the United States is as surely headed for an increasingly active part in foreign trade and policies, as that on the morrow the sun will rise again?"

"Corporations engaged in selling abroad do not give sufficient consideration to the problem of training men to carry on the work. This is a mistake. Foreign trade should be in the hands of men who have studied its principles and its technique, and have a proper appreciation of its possibilities. Universities are prophylactic just such men. They are not being turned out by the whole sale, but they are being selected. The supply of trained students is available. We ask you, Do you or do you not want these men?"

"It takes a stout heart, good feet, American blood, nerves that do not flinch, and a spirit that can never be dampened, to engage upon such a career. But that describes the men today who are training in the interests of American business. They are no mollycoddlers. But they cannot live on promises. It is to your interest to help solve the problem of putting the foreign trade student to work."
