Bobbed Hair Threatens Prosperity of Chefoo

LONG BEACH, Cal. (AP)—The future commercial prosperity of Chefoo, China, a city of 100,000 population, can be determined only when it is known whether American women will continue to bob their hair or return to flowing tresses, said Captain Milton Minnis, United States vice-consul at Chefoo, while visiting his home here.

Business men of Chefoo anxiously await word as to the tansorial mode to be established by American women.

"Chefoo's chief industry is making hair nets and they sell \$5,000,000 worth to France and other countries," said Captain Minnis.

"The hair is gathered from all parts of the world and the weaving is done by Chinese girls. Much of it is done in private homes and inspected at a factory. Factory exports get more pay than those that work at home, drawing as high as seven cents a day. In China the price for the hair runs from \$1 to \$2 per gross."

Dry Wheat Treatment Wins

The new dry method of treating wheat for protection against stinking smut has made so rapid progress in Oregon that growers are expected to purchase some 50,000 pounds of copper carbonate dust for the 1924 planting. The amount used last year was estimated at 45,000 pounds by E. H. Jackson, extension crop specialist who is in close touch with the field situation. Success in getting a stand with the dust-treated grain, so pronounced last year, may lead even more farmers than at first might be expected to substitute the liquid method for the dry this year.

American Guard Menaced by Deadly Coconut Tree Scale

AGANA, Guam, (AP)—United States marines, under the command of Captain William W. Allen, who, in effect, police of this island, are leading parties of natives in a concerted attack on a most pernicious enemy. The enemy is an aspidiotous destroyer, a scale insect pest, recently discovered to be destroying coconut palms, banana trees, alligator pear trees and tarr.

More than 9,000 trees were found infected in widely separated localities all over the island. The insects are so small that they barely are visible. They attack trees by sucking the sap, causing the foliage to turn a mottled yellow at first, and in the last stages to assume the appearance of having been scorched by fire.

The scale is one of the most destructive known. It recently wiped out the coconut industry of the island of Sapan, 120 miles from Guam.

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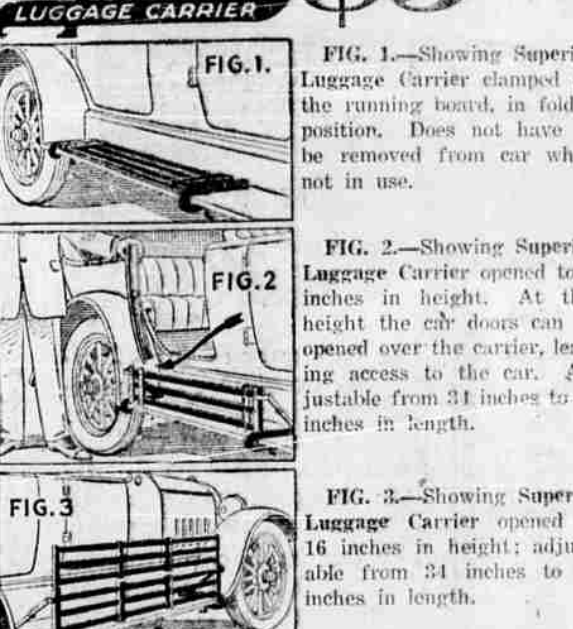
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
