ly decided to buy five animals in the near future. These will be of the highest class available and will cost the association in the neighborhood of \$175 each. The purchase of the bulls will be financed by having the proposition on one share per cow. It is thought possible to secure signers of approximately 40 cows per block, in which one of the association bulls will be kept. Ten years breeding service will be given each shareholder at a cost of approximately \$4.50 per cow over a period of ten years.

As the arrangements at the present time one bull will be placed in the Promise section, one in Wallawa and three in the upper part of the valley.

This is the first co-operative effort on the part of dairymen in this county to avail themselves of the opportunity of building up their dairy herds to a higher standard.

## Forest Fire Situation Outlook Quite Dreary

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alash burning. State forest boards in other states are meeting to discuss unusual regulatory measures. The United States forest service is contemplating closing the national forests to visitors. The state of Oregon has appealed to the war department for airplanes to assist in patrol. The U. S. weather bureau has already agreed to detail meteorologists to perfect a forecast system to advise protective agencies and loggers of weather conditions affecting the spread of fire. Demand for humidity-reading instruments by forest officers and logging camps has exhausted the Pacific coast supply and telegraphic orders are rushing the factories. Newspapers are being urged to give every assistance by cartoons and editorials to bring the situation before motorists, campers, settlers and loggers, so that fire, matches and cigarettes will always be completely extinguished. Patrol and fire-fighting forces are everywhere being swiftly recruited to full strength but unless every precaution is taken, the experts say, there is grave danger of conflagrations beyond the power of the fire-fighting agencies to control, resulting in heavy loss of life and property.

"It would not be worth while for us to come together if we did not believe that every wrong and fault can be cured, if we did not come in faith, hope and joy. We represent that great sound Amer-

that they would accept the substitute. Those who worked out the substitute said they also had the support of representatives of farm organizations who have been working in the interests of the McNary-Haugen proposal.

## Fight to Be Renewed.

Immediately after the defeat of the measure, however, George Jewett, head of a committee of representatives of farm organizations, declared in a statement that the fight for enactment of the McNary-Haugen bill would be renewed at a later date, and announced that a conference would be held in St. Paul June 17 and 18, to work out plans to that end.

"In failing to enact into law the principles of the McNary-Haugen export corporation bill," said Mr. Jewett's statement, "the present congress has refused to concede to American agriculture equal opportunity and equal protection with that which the nation grants to other industries and institutions. Congress has freely admitted the plight of the farmer, but it has refused to take the steps dictated by simple justice toward correction of it. Conditions which have precipitated nationwide agricultural collapse.

"We cannot believe that this decision of congress is to be taken as final. Otherwise we should have no choice except to return to the millions of people who compose the farming industry of the country with the word that the American nation no longer held a place for them, their work, or the production of their lands and toll.

"We believe the decision of congress in refusing justice to agriculture is dictated more by misunderstanding of the underlying causes of present conditions than by a cold-blooded purpose of industrial and financial aggrandizement accomplished through the ruin of the farming industry."
