Gala Fourth of July Celebration Under Way; Committees in Charge Hard at Work.

ELGIN, Ore. (Special to the Observer).—The Fourth of July committees have a month in which to complete all arrangements for the two days celebration that is to mark the passing of another anniversary. Elgin will be the only town in the county that will celebrate the Fourth this year, and its citizens are planning on a celebration for two days that will be full of interest to the visitor every hour in each day.

The parade committee, composed of Wm. Hinton, Earl Chandler and Harry Thomas, haven't yet lined up this feature of the program, but we are assured that it will be well worth seeing.

Another feature in the hands of an able committee is the arena sports. Matt Bawock is chairman of this committee and with him are Dan Chandler, Henry Parsons, Laure Geiger and Howard Haze.
