# TAXATION IS MAJOR ISSUE

### Voters of North Carolina to Cast Ballots in Primary Election on June 7th.

RALEIGH, N. C. (AP)—With taxation as the principal issue, democrats of North Carolina on June 7 will vote in a state-wide primary to elect a nominee for governor, one United States senator, ten congressmen, and nominees for a full slate of state offices. To oppose the republican nominee at the general election in November.

Angus Wilton McLean of Lenoir, former chairman of the War Finance Corporation and former assistant secretary of the treasury, is opposed for the democratic nomination as governor by Josiah Whitton Bailey of Raleigh, attorney and at one time an internal revenue collector in this state. The winner of the nomination will be opposed in the fall elections by Isaac M. McKinley of Elizabeth City, who was declared the republican nominee by acclamation at the convention of that party several months ago.

In his campaign speeches Mr. McLean introduced a new phase to the tax question, an executive submission of the present budget bureau with a budget commission headed by the governor, who would present the findings of that body to the legislature and who, under legislative enactment, would be responsible for the carrying out of the budget measures deemed necessary by the general assembly. He also declared in favor of the present system of taxation in North Carolina, saying he believed it correct in principle, and that through it much had been accomplished by the state and its counties which otherwise would not have been possible.

Mr. Bailey, taking issue with this view, asserted in his campaign addresses that the system endorsed by McLean placed too great a burden of taxation on land and the farmer, and taxed the producers of crops heavily while business escaped with light taxation.

Senator F. M. Simmons will be certified to the general election, having not been opposed in the primary.

### FARM RELIEF ABANDONED AT PRESENT

Kansas and Sanders of Indiana both members of the Republican steering committee, had discussed with the president a plan they had evolved to place the marketing abroad of surplus wheat, flour and meat products in the hands of the war finance corporation, and the word had gone out that if the substitute proved acceptable to the president it would be pressed to a vote as an administration measure. **Mondell Sees Coolidge.**

The announcement that no action would be taken was made at the Frank W. Mondell, a war finance corporation director, from a conference with Mr. Coolidge, had discussed the situation for more than an hour with Representative Longworth, Representative Tinsler, Sanders and Summitt, Republican, Oregon.

No comment was available in the White House as to the president's views, and Mr. Mondell declined to discuss the situation beyond stating that he had left it to the war finance corporation, and an announcement. The statement issued by the majority leader follows: "Since the defeat of the McNary-Haugen bill in the house, in consultation with many members of the house and the official representatives of the large farm organizations, I have been attempting to arrive at some satisfactory measure for the relief of the agricultural situation. We have also discussed the matter with the president, **Cannot Find Substitute.**

The large majority recorded against the McNary-Haugen bill made it evident that any legislative proposition embodying the basic principles of this bill could not be passed. While fully realizing the condition of agriculture, and the most earnest desire to bring relief as far as legislatively possible, we have so far been unable to work out a plan which would command the necessary support."

**BOY, 3, IS HIT BY AUTO**  
MILBURN, Ore.—Murray Kotelnick, 3, was near death as a result of being run down by William F. Boudet of Portland. The boy's injuries were not considered serious at first, but his condition grew decidedly worse and it was feared that he was injured internally and in such a way as to cause his death.

Eye witnesses of the accident concentrated the driver of the car as the boy dashed out into the street while running ahead of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Will Kotelnick.

**Postal Revenue Too High.**  
WINNIPEG, Man. (AP)—Postmaster E. T. Baxter urged abolition of the three-cent rate tax postage stamp, when he announced recently that the post office revenue of Winnipeg broke all records for the fiscal year, exceeding \$2,000,000. The postmaster contended that revenue would be increased with the return of the two-cent rate. He pointed out that one could now afford to mail a letter from London for two cents, while it was three cents to send a letter from Victoria to Vancouver, B. C.

appear occasionally as a lay preacher.

Members of congress have a new reason for putting up a hard fight for re-election this year. For if they don't come back they'll have no opportunity to enjoy the privileges of the new Congressional Country club, which has just been opened as the "paradise of officialdom."

This new club layout is declared to be the largest and most complete in the country. The clubhouse and equipment cost a round million dollars. The grounds, comprising more than 400 acres of rolling hill and dale in Maryland, 12 miles from the White House, gives room for two 18-hole and one 9-hole golf courses, an artificial lake for swimming, and special facilities for horse-back riding.

President Coolidge was the guest of honor at the official opening of the other night. Cabinet members, senators and representatives, high army and navy officials, visiting governors, diplomats and other dignitaries gave evidence that the club's claim to favor with "officialdom" was justified.

The development of this new club, which gives promise of being the most largest and finest in the capital, is due to the activities of three members of congress—Hunt Cole of Ohio, S. O. Bland of Virginia and Oscar Lathrop of Indiana.

A tentative membership was enrolled which established the responsible support behind the movement. Herbert Hoover was made president and Oscar Underwood first vice president. Colonel C. O. Sherrill, superintendent of public buildings and grounds in the District of Columbia, headed a committee in charge of development of grounds and building. Admiral Jay T. Grayson was made chairman of the membership committee.

The vision and energy these men brought to bear in the development of this new play place for Washington officialdom has given the capital a center for social and recreational forethought, not equalled anywhere in these United States.

But it opens just as congress is about to adjourn for the campaign.

So, if your congressman puts up more than usually energetic fight to be sent back to Washington, the reason may lie in his desire to qualify for two more years of golf at the Congressional Country club.

In view of the conditions brought about with in the past few years on account of the increased cost of paper, printing of checks, check covers, pass books and other materials used in connection with the operation of checking accounts, and the cost to the bank in handling a checking account carrying an average balance of less than \$50.00, being considerably in excess of any profit that can be derived from this account, it has become necessary that the banks throughout the country adopt a more conservative and business like method in order to avoid loss to serving small depositors. The following rules have been mutually adopted by the banks of Union County to take effect June 1st, 1924.

1. A Minimum Charge of 50 cents will be made on all loans.

2. The cost of extra printing on all checks for business or personal use will be charged by the customer.

3. The initial charge of all contracts and agreements handled in excess will be \$1.00.

4. Loans of less than \$500.00 will be discounted and interest collected quarterly on larger amounts.
