DRY LEADER MAY BE HEAD

COLUMBUS, (AP)—Dr. D. Leitch Colvin of New York, and Charles S. Randall, formerly a representative in congress from California, are among those most prominently mentioned for the nomination for president by the Prohibition party at its national convention here June 4-6. Dr. Colvin was the party's vice-presidential candidate four years ago.

In addition to nominating candidates for president and vice president, the party will adopt a platform and elect a new national committee. The Ohio unit will meet in conjunction with the national body.

Concerning possible issues, J. A. Murray of Lincoln, Neb., a committeeman, stated that the party would undoubtedly inject a "fighting plank for Volstead Act re-education, protection and enforcement."

"We are not so much interested in what the other parties may say regarding enforcement of the Eighteenth Amendment," Mr. Murray declared, "as we are in having the law preserved in its present state." Asked if he thought the convention would discuss the availability of Al Smith, governor of New York, for the presidency, Mr. Murray declared that the dry forces "have no fight with Mr. Smith." "We are not interested in personalities," he said. "All we want is a man who is assuredly dry."

The present national committee of the Prohibition party will meet at 5:30 p. m. June 4, to wind up its business, after which there will be a public mass meeting.

The temporary chairman, Herman P. Paris of Clinton, Mo., whose friends also are talking of placing his name in nomination as the standard bearer, will deliver the keynote address. Mr. Paris has been actively identified with the prohibi-

O. A. C. GIVES SAFE CANNING INSTRUCTIONS

"Safe home canning requires careful attention to every step in the process."
 This is the rule announced by the O. A. C. extension service in putting out a bulletin with succinct directions for each step, on information supplied by the federal bureau of home economics and approved by the horticultural products department of the college.

The new time tables for processing supersede all former recommendations and tables published by the state and the federal departments on home canning. They give the safe time for green fruits and small fruits, and for most vegetables.

Only the clean sound and fresh produce is to be used for canning. It should be taken preferably within two hours after harvesting and thoroughly washed as for cooking. Every bit of soil is to go, as it may carry dangerous bacteria hard to kill.

The fruits and vegetables are then given a short pre-cooking. Full directions for processing follow the general instruction. Bulletin may be obtained by applying to the college at Corvallis.
