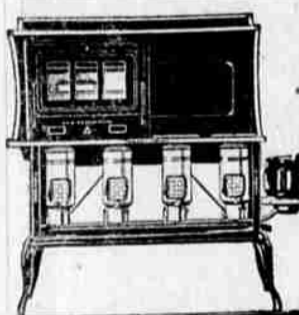

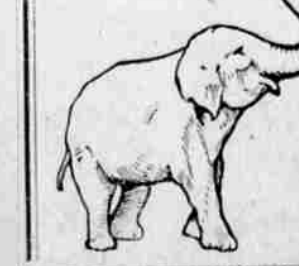

### Hints for the Housewife

**A New Pudding.** Here is a good dessert for the warm days of spring. Mix four tablespoons of cornstarch with a little cold milk until it is a smooth paste. Heat one quart of milk in an enameled ware double boiler, stirring in three tablespoons of sugar, one tablespoonful of butter and then the moistened cornstarch. Cook in the enameled ware double boiler twenty minutes. Then add one cup of chopped dates. Remove from fire and add one teaspoonful of vanilla. Let it get cold and serve plain or with whipper cream.

**Prepare for Pleas.** With spring weather and better roads motor drives and picnics again become part of the regular routine. Now is the time to overhaul the luncheon basket and make sure it is all ready for the summer campaign. It pays well to have a regular outfit of enameled ware for this basket, which shall be used for nothing else. Enamelled ware is not only light and easily cleaned, but it is not liable to the breakage which so readily occurs out of doors. Then it means much saving in time in the preparation of lunch if all the implements are at hand and do not have to be hunted up. Plates, saucers, and mugs are indispensable, and other articles can be added as experience dictates.

**Society Scintillates On Papeete Beaches**

PAPEETE, Tahiti (AP)—A great demand has arisen in these western islands for bicycles and motor cars, although the roads are more tracks. The Chinese in Papeete have endeavored to satisfy the demand by combing all the old junk heaps for ancient bicycles and antique "tin lizzies." A little tinkering and a few coats of paint, and the rejuvenated contrivances are ready to be exchanged for quantities of vanilla far in excess of the value professed.

This is one of the consequences of the visitation at Papeete of "vanilla millionaires" from the Leeward group of the Society Islands. These islands escaped the plant disease that devastated the plantations of Tahiti some years ago. Thus, when the price of vanilla beans soared recently to great heights, these islanders had full crops for which they received sums beyond their wildest dreams. Papeete being the Paris of the South Seas, these newly-rich nabobs have been flocking here to spend their gains.

The roads in and about the city have become perilous from filchers, chartered by the week, loaded with fat Kanakas, who rush about at high speed to the consternation of pedestrians. Their women folk are astonishing the beach dwellers with glowing silks, high-heeled shoes and picture hats.

This array of spending will continue until the last franc is gone. Then the natives will return to the peaceful shores of Rakata and Iora and resume their old pursuits of climbing the mountains for "fel" and combing the reefs for fish. But, having had a whiff of a time, they will be content.

**Distinctive Monetary Issue Planned for Palestine**

JERUSALEM. (AP)—The introduction of a distinctive Palestine monetary system, to replace the Egyptian money now in use, is contemplated by the government and a commission has been appointed to make recommendations to the ruler.

Not since the days of the Roman emperors has Palestine had a money of its own, having used that of its rulers through the centuries since then. Egyptian money was introduced here after the occupation by General Allenby's forces. It is planned that the new money shall be issued directly by the government without the intermediary of any bank.

BERLIN. (AP)—A letter written by Eleonora Duse to Sudermann when she first presented his play "Magda" is printed here in connection with the death of the distinguished actress. She wrote: "It took your Magda ten years to come on the stage. But it required 20 years for me to learn to enter the stage. Your Magda was allowed to stay in her parental home till she was 17 before she was compelled to leave it. But I was turned over to the stage when I was 14 and simply told 'now play.' Therefore I am longing for the day when I shall have my rest. In the meantime, however, I find an opportunity to present my real self in your play and to give something of my very being to the public."

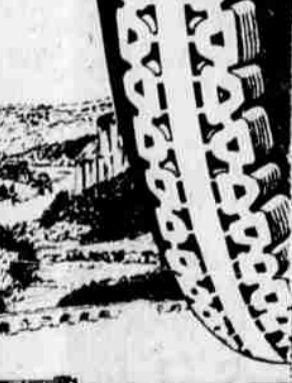
