Mrs. Long Presented In Recital

Mrs. William Long at a piano recital given at the library auditorium last evening conducted her audience through a difficult but unusually well played program of concert selections which included works by Chopin, Beethoven, Liszt and other composers.

Mrs. Long's first number was Beethoven's famous "Moonlight Sonata." The sonata, for years loved by musicians and public generally as a composition of rare beauty, was made doubly so by the interpretation given it by the performer.

The second group of pieces included, "Negro Dance" by Cyril Scott, "Second Nocturne" by Moszkowski. The first was an exceptionally interesting little selection with some particularly difficult bass passages and peculiar rhythms, written in the modern style. "Second Nocturne" by Moszkowski featured effective trills and scale passages in the treble and "In Autumn" was in similar style and also beautifully played by the artist.

In the final suite the real test of the evening came. All three selections are considered by teachers and artists alike in the final classification of a student. Many great pianists are proud of their interpretation of the "March Militaire" by Schubert-Tausig and regularly

include it in their programs. The two other selections of the group, "Cantique d'Amour" by Liszt and "Nocturne op. 15 No. 2" by Chopin are equally difficult of execution.

Mrs. Long met the test superbly, however, and quite carried the house with these three final selections. "Cantique d'Amour," the first of the three played, was replete with difficult single and double arpeggio work. The "Nocturne" was played next and then came the "March Militaire" with its several movements, each seemingly more harmonious and difficult than the last.

Mrs. Long has been studying with Mrs. E. J. Green for the past several years and both ladies were afterwards showered with sincere congratulations by the members of the audience.

During the interlude Mrs. Ray Fuller, soprano, a pupil of Mrs. A. L. Richardson, sang two Indian love lyrics, "Spring Song, The Gods in Women" from the Opera, "Shawnee" by Charles Wakefield Cadman and "Till I Wake" by Amy Woodford-Sinden. Mrs. Fuller gave a brief introduction to the first number, explaining the situation in the opera from which the song was taken. As an encore she sang, "The Fairy Pipes." All three selections were well given and received the enthusiastic applause of the audience.
