EXPERT WARNS WOMEN AGAINST COSMETICS USE

CHICAGO (AP)—Cosmetics were described as instruments toward skin ills and homeliness, rather than auxiliaries of beauty when Prof. H. N. Cole, associate professor of dermatology at Western Reserve university, spoke before the convention of the American Medical Association.

Prof. Cole deplored the increasing use of cosmetics, which he said were always harmful to the complexion, and revealed statistics showing their consumption and the amount of these women are unaware of the danger they are running from such use.

"There is the pure mechanical obstruction by creams, powders, and rouges employed on the face. The pores in our skins were intended by nature to serve as lubricating and excretory ducts. If these are constantly closed off, the mechanical obstruction alone is bound to injure any skin.

BIRTH CONTROL ESSENTIAL SAYS MEDICAL HEAD

CHICAGO (AP)—Limitation of population rather than increase is the logical social ideal of the time," Dr. William A. Pency, newly elected president of the American Medical Association, said in his inauguration address tonight at the association's convention.

"If no effort is made at birth control, nature will take charge of the situation by eliminating those least able to resist," Dr. Pency asserted. "When this condition of saturation is reached, the humane plans of socialistic utopianism of today will be wrecked in the struggle by society for mere existence."

"Man has now covered the desirable parts of the earth. Until now, men always had new hospitable territory over which they could spread when population became too dense. Today there is no longer a frontier. The United States has in 120 years passed 100,000,000 population. Within the span of children now living, our population will reach 175,000,000.

Union Stock Show Trophies Taken by Owners of Animals Judged the Best in Their Classes.

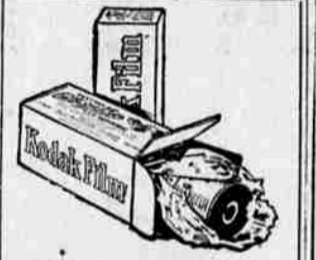

She also won the blue ribbon on a registered white sow and a litter of 11 pigs and received a special prize of a silver tray.

Marvin Daniels won first on a registered Berkshire sow a little over a year old; first and second on a sow pig under six months old; junior championship on sow under one year; senior championship on sow any age. In the open classes he won the same prizes and in addition won first premium in the market hog class; first premium in the pure bred pig class; second premium on sow and litter. He was awarded three trophies and \$20.

Howard Gussel entered one registered short-horn steer and won first prize in the boys' and girls' club classes and third in the open championship in the club classes.

Elmer Fulp won the pure bred Holstein bull, offered by Dr. Phy on the best grade dairy cow. This is the second time this cow has won this special prize.

Robert French won every ribbon on his Hampshire sheep. John Williams won every ribbon on his Chester White hogs and was awarded grand championship board of all breeds. Mrs. Jesse Lincoln was awarded third on a grade dairy heifer between 15 and 24 months.
