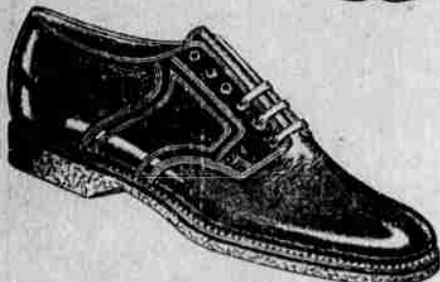

Sixty-Five Members of La Grande's Company E Join Other Guardsmen in Rose City.

PORTLAND, Ore. (Special to the Observer by Mail)—June 10.—We, the national guard's Company E, 188th Infantry, arrived in Portland at 7:10 o'clock this morning. We leave for camp at 10 o'clock.

The national guard units from all over Oregon, Washington and Idaho are meeting here, and are arriving on every train.

We are not allowed to leave the railway station but we can see that the city is making ready for the troops which opens Wednesday (today). We ate breakfast in the depot cafe and did we do justice to the victuals—yes, very hot!

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REORGANIZE MUSIC SCHOOL

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore. (Special)—A complete reorganization of the school of music at the University of Oregon, designed to increase the effectiveness of instruction, has been adopted and will go into effect in the fall term. Hereafter the work will be organized under six departments.

Dr. John J. Landsbury is dean of the school.

Heads of all departments have been chosen from members of the school of music faculty. Under the new organization there will be a department of opera, department of voice, department of organ and department of public school music.

The newly-created department of opera will be headed by Miss Rose McGrew, formerly head of the department of voice. This department hopes to produce student operas on the campus. Miss McGrew will spend the summer in Chicago investigating the operatic field. She will do some coaching with some of the leading exponents of opera in English. She also expects to bring several thousand dollars worth of costumes from abroad to be used in campus operatic productions.

The department of voice will be under the leadership of John Sheffer, instructor in voice in the university. With him in the department will be Miss McGrew.

Tex Underwood, director of the University Orchestra, will be head of the department of violin and orchestral instruments. Others in this department will be Jane O'Reilly, violin; Gwendolyn Lampshire, violin; Beulah Clark, flute; and Laura Trechner, cello.

Mrs. Jane Thacher will have charge of the department of piano. Associated with her will be John Stark Evans, Aurora Potter (violin), Beulah Clark, and Minnie E. Douglas. George Hopkins and Theodore Price Waldstrom who are connected with this department will be on leave of absence next year. It is expected that two new instructors in piano will be added before fall.

The department of organ will be organized under John Stark Evans who will be chairman of the department. The department of public school music will be under the direction of Mrs. Anne Landsbury Beck.

FIELDS TO BE STUDIED
PENDLETON, Ore. — Professor G. H. Hislop, head of the farm crops department of Oregon Agricultural college, and D. E. Stephens, superintendent of the Moore experiment station, the largest dry land experiment station in the Pacific northwest has arrived here to take part in the annual tour and field meeting of wheat farmers.

The caravan of farmers, headed by Fred Benton, county agent, will spend the entire day in the field looking at wheat and checking up on practices of seedling, time of seedling, methods of cultivating the soil and varieties. The field meeting proper will be held at the county grain nursery where several hundred varieties of wheat are growing in experimental plots.

CO-OPERATION HELD NEEDED
PENDLETON, Ore. — Co-operative cotton is the big need of the northwest, according to Mac Hoke, secretary of the Oregon Wool Growers' association, who returned from the wool auction sales at Heppner, London and Shoshone. The prices received were less than growers had expected, according to Mr. Hoke.

"I am more convinced than ever that what the growers need is a co-operative organization that would include not merely a dozen clips, but 75 per cent of the wool of half a dozen states," he declared. "Then the sheep men would stand a better chance of getting the value of their products."
