STEP FAVORS NEW PRIMARY

Jackson County Republican Committee Advocates Radical Changes in Present Law.

MEDFORD, Ore. (Special)—The Republican committee of Jackson county, one of the most active in Oregon, has taken the initiative in declaring for a revision of the primary law, for the holding of state and county conventions and for recommending candidates for state and county offices be voted for at the primaries, and is the first county in the state to set an exact date for the holding of the first county convention.

The county convention will be held in Medford the second Monday in January, 1925.

S. Hunter Smith, of Medford, was elected state committeeman.

CHANGE MADE IN TAX LAWS

PORTLAND, Ore. (Special)—

Under the new revenue bill which has just been signed by President Coolidge several changes are made in the various excise taxes, according to a statement issued by Charles C. Huntley, collector of internal revenue. The tax on soft drinks, cereal beverages, fountain syrups and similar articles has been repealed and became effective with the signing of the bill. All other excise taxes remain in effect for 30 days or until July 1 without any change, and taxpayers must not fail to account for these taxes in the month of June.

After July 1 there will be no tax on candy, hunting and bowie knives, fiveries and fiveries hats and hats, hunting and shooting garments, carpets, trunks, valises, portable lamps and similar articles now taxed. Effective on the same date there will be a reduction in manufacturers' excise taxes on automobiles, trucks, parts and accessories. Also, on July 1, the tax will be taken off telephone and telegraph messages, on admissions of 50 cents and less, on articles of jewelry selling for \$20 and less, on watches selling for \$50 and less, and on silver plated flat tableware. Those taxes, however, must be paid for the month of June.

All stamp taxes will remain in force and effect as at present until July 1. Thereafter there will be no promissory notes and drafts. The stamp tax will remain effective as to issues and transfers of capital stock, bonds of indebtedness, deeds, proxies, powers of attorney and other instruments now taxed.

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Tax Section Illegal.

ASTORIA, Ore. — Section 4609 of the Oregon state laws is illegal because it is so complicated in its provisions that it is unworkable. That, in short, is the decision of Circuit Judge Eakin, handed down in the case of the city of Astoria against Judge C. S. Cornelius and the other members of the Clatsop county court. The action was brought to compel the defendants to levy a road tax under the provisions of that act and was submitted to the court upon demurrer which averred the act was so indefinite and conflicting that it was not enforceable.

The opinion of Judge Eakin is the first one handed down by any court in the state on the validity of this act, and is, therefore, of more than ordinary interest.

Women Far Outnumber Men On Remote Babuyan Islands

MANILA, (AP) — The recent earthquakes and volcanic eruptions in the Babuyan Islands have brought forth statements from mariners who recently have been in that region that a large portion of the population is composed of women. It is said this situation is due to the fact that so many of the men have lost their lives at sea.

The male population of the islands engage almost entirely in fishing as a means of livelihood, and the frequent typhoons which sweep over that region play havoc with their frail fishing craft. It is stated that on one island of the group, with a population of about 200, there are 15 women to one man.
