homage to the forty-eight who died

In the line of duty Thursday in No. 2 turret, battleship Mississippi. Forty-seven caskets were placed in a form of a cross and the forty-eighth body is already en route to Georgia.

Rear Admiral Pratt paid an eloquent tribute to the men who died at their posts. Comrades of the fleet stood at attention in a hollow square during the final farewell.

Vice Admiral Henry A. Wiley, acting commander in chief of the battle fleet, who presided Rear Admiral Pratt, said "the accident that so quickly snuffed out the lives of 48 of our best—found fire at their posts, putting forth the best that was in them. Their last moments gave the most positive proof of their courage and devotion. They gave up their lives as heroically as ever they could have in battle."

Admiral Pratt, in concluding his oration, after paying tribute to the heroism and coolness of the Mississippi's crew in the hour of danger and to you shipmates, who have lost a dear friend, these lives have not been given in vain. The story of their heroism and their faithfulness to duty will be told again and again. The lesson they have given to youth of our land is one of pure gold."
