WOMEN TRAVEL FAR TO GLIMPSE FAMOUS "SHEIK"

TANGIER, Morocco (AP). — Ratsul, the Robin Hood of Morocco, who inspired John Hay's "Pardicaris alive or Ratsul dead," which provoked wild applause in the Republican national convention at Chicago 20 years ago, has ceased to be a great international issue. He has become almost a legend.

Ratsul has quit kidnapping prominent Englishmen and Americans for ransom, and is living in retirement at Tazrut, in the heart of Morocco, surrounded by faithful followers whom he supports from the proceeds of his years of brigandage and the funds Germany supplied to him for the purpose of keeping the anti-French native tribes in a state of ferment during the great war.

Ian Pardicaris, the wealthy American whom Ratsul kidnapped from his villa in Tangier and carried into the Atlas mountains, died in the United States several years ago. Sir Harry Maclean, the English chief of the sultan's bodyguard, whom Ratsul kidnapped and held prisoner for seven months, has been forgotten by newspaper readers. But Ratsul is such a picturesque figure that even in retirement he is not forgotten.

NEW YORK (AP). — Defying the patents and contraptions of man, "Minnie," the world's largest office building's veteran mouse exterminator, in given preference and a rating of "superior" in the rodent trapping field by C. T. Coley, operating manager of the Equitable building here.

"Minnie" is but one of many cats whose prowess in their instinctive work is commended in reports of building managers to the National Association of Building Owners and Managers. In each case they are regarded as part of the operating equipment and their care requires the full services of an attendant.

Respectable living quarters and the privilege of using the elevator are other conveniences afforded these workers. In the case of "Minnie," Mr. Coley says: "Her work has been very effective in keeping the Equitable building free from mice for six years. Her cost has been practically nothing. When a mouse is discovered, Minnie is installed in the room until the next morning, after which there are no further complaints."

"Minnie has learned to place herself in front of elevator gates and wait until the door opens. She then steps into the car and rides to an upper floor where she 'mooes' when she wishes to get off. She returns by the same route to her headquarters on the fourth floor late in the afternoon to be fed. In the evening, when not on duty, she uses the elevator to go to the main floor so that she may go out. Later in the evening she returns. mit that it is a long shot. Frankly, they doubt that it can be done. A much more likely result, in the opinion of wise political minds, is that the reaction to the Baker speech may project him before the convention and that Baker instead of Cox will prove to be Ohio's real figure in the contest.

The most rapidly inflating boom of the immediate pre-convention days, however, is that for Senator Carter Glass of Virginia. Glass combines certain elements of strength, politically, that put him well up in the list of likely "compromise" candidates.

As a member of the Wilson cabinet and a champion of Wilson policies he would hold the favor of a large part of the former president's followers in the party. He would be acceptable to the moderately progressive or mildly conservative groups in the party.

On the other hand, Glass would be wholly acceptable to "big business" and "the interests."

This would be due not so much, perhaps, to the belief that he would lean unduly in their direction, but to the fact that they already know where he stands. They would be in no doubt as to his attitude on the majority of questions that might arise.

As chairman of the House committee that wrote the Federal Reserve Act, and as secretary of treasury they have had ample opportunity to dissect, analyze and classify him. And he is down in their books as "satisfactory."

As a "safe and sane" candidate, one that would not rock the boat or upset any apple-carts, the conservatives are carefully refraining from throwing any rocks at Glass.

Court Debars Forgetfulness VIENNA (AP). — Found guilty of murdering his wife and sentenced to 16 years in prison, Karl Ostermeier must spend each anniversary of her death in utterly dark solitary confinement on bread and water as a further punishment. Ostermeier was convicted on circumstantial evidence.

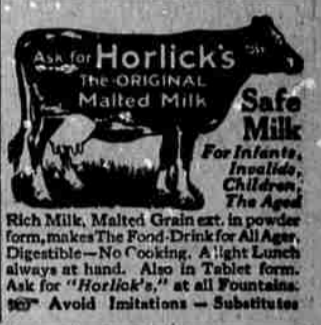

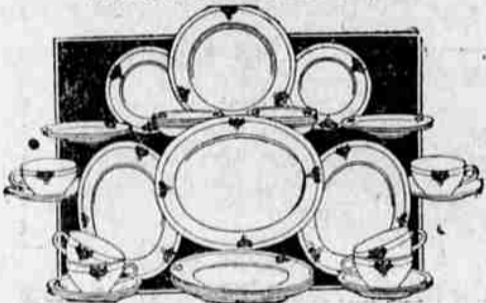

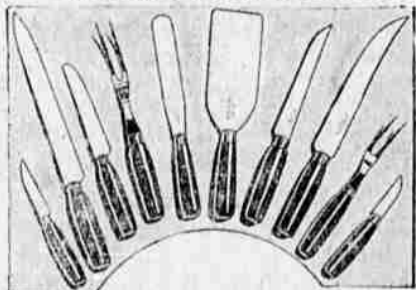
