### GREAT FUTURE FOR ARGENTINA FARMS EXPECTED

BUENOS AIRES (AP).—Argentina is a land where fortunes are to be made in the intensive type of farming. In the judgment of Leon M. Estabrook, an American agricultural expert who has been reorganizing the statistical and crop reporting department of the Argentine ministry of agriculture.

Referring to the marvelous agricultural development in his own country in the past 25 years, Mr. Estabrook said he felt confident that similar changes would be witnessed in Argentina within the next 10 or 20 years. "The tide of immigration already has begun to flow in the direction of Argentina," he said. "The vacant spaces soon will be filled up and become productive, and new crops such as cotton, sugar, fruits, nuts and vegetables will become important. The mineral and forest resources of Argentina will be developed, new industries will be established to manufacture and utilize the raw material produced in the country, and to supply the needs of a rapidly growing population. New towns

will spring up and all this activity will give employment to the men and capital of Argentina. "I expect these changes to come rapidly, because the people of Argentina impress me as being very adaptable, which is a sign of youth, vitality and intelligence. They are quick to adopt improved methods and can therefore profit by the experience of other countries."

### Nippon Election Was Extremely Expensive

TOKYO (AP).—The most expensive election in Japan's parliamentary history was that held this month to choose the 461 members of the house of representatives. Estimates of the total expenditure of the candidates and parties, not including the necessary expenses of the government, range between \$17,000,000 and \$22,000,000, with most of the estimates approaching the larger figure.

With more than 1,000 candidates in the field, it is estimated that each candidate spent an average of \$26,000.

hashi, president of the Seikyukai party, defeated his Seiyuanto rival, Ichiban Tago, by a narrow margin of 49 votes, brought out the most lavish spending. Mr. Takahashi is believed to have spent nearly \$150,000, while his defeated rival disposed of about \$100,000.

In Tokyo the largest amount was spent by the independent candidate Takagi, who got rid of \$50,000 and won. The average for each candidate in Tokyo is placed at \$25,000. That money is counted for a great deal in shows by the case of a candidate named Mori. He had only \$10,000 to spend and received only 30 votes to his successful rival's 2,000.

Woodburn Pioneer Dies. WOODBURN, Ore.—Mrs. B. F. McKee, an Oregon pioneer of 1846, died here. She was a native of Booneville, Mo., and crossed the plains with her mother and Grandfather McPherson, locating near Monitor. She was married to Benjamin M. McKee August 12, 1856. They had resided in Woodburn since 1879.

Surviving are her husband and five children—Rodney McKee of Monitor, Mrs. Martha Chalmers of Multnomah, Mrs. Clara Bradley of Milwaukie, Mrs. E. C. Malloy of The Dalles and Mrs. Nellie Woodside of Wapinitia. Funeral services will be held from the Methodist Episcopal church Thursday at 2 P. M. Interment will be at Belle Pass cemetery.

Hungry Hair Seals Threaten Heavy Loss to Salmon Fishers

YANCOUVER, B. C. (AP).—Destruction of one-sixth to one-third of the average spring salmon catch in the Fraser river by hair seals, has caused local fishermen to fear the fish will become extinct and a large revenue be lost. So clever are the seals that it is a race between them and the fish-catchers every time a bobbing cork on a net shows that a netman has struck it. The seals generally win. Wolf-like, a seal goes for the throat of a fish, and usually a head is all that is left in the net. Fishermen have tried spreading a blind net to protect the actual fishing net, but this seal, evidently learning the trick, drive salmon into the net to make capture easier. Not only do seals live on salmon, but when their hunger is appeased, they kill for sport, tearing the fish out of the water as a cat plays with a mouse. A seal can throw a 20-pound salmon clear of the net to him that his master was water, the fishermen declare.

### FORMER CITY MANAGER HERE

#### George Garrett, of Grand Junction, Colo., Visits Old Haunts for a Few Days.

George Garrett, city manager of La Grande from 1920 to 1922 is in La Grande for a few days looking over the improvements in the city in the last two years.

Mr. Garrett left here in 1922 for Grand Junction, Colo., where he took up the reins of the city management and has since conducted a successful administration of civic affairs.

Grand Junction has shown much improvement under the Garrett regime. A reservoir with a capacity of 23 1/2 million gallons of water has been constructed which furnishes the city with an inexhaustible supply of good water. New cast iron water mains have been installed throughout the city, and Grand Junction has done a great deal of paving in the last year also, according to Mr. Garrett. Perhaps one of the most important improvements under Mr. Garrett's administration has been the installation of sanitary and storm sewers in most of the streets of the city.

He is taking a short vacation and will leave La Grande for a few days in Portland and other coast cities before returning to Colorado. Mr. Garrett is accompanied by Mike Loughlin, also of Grand Junction.
