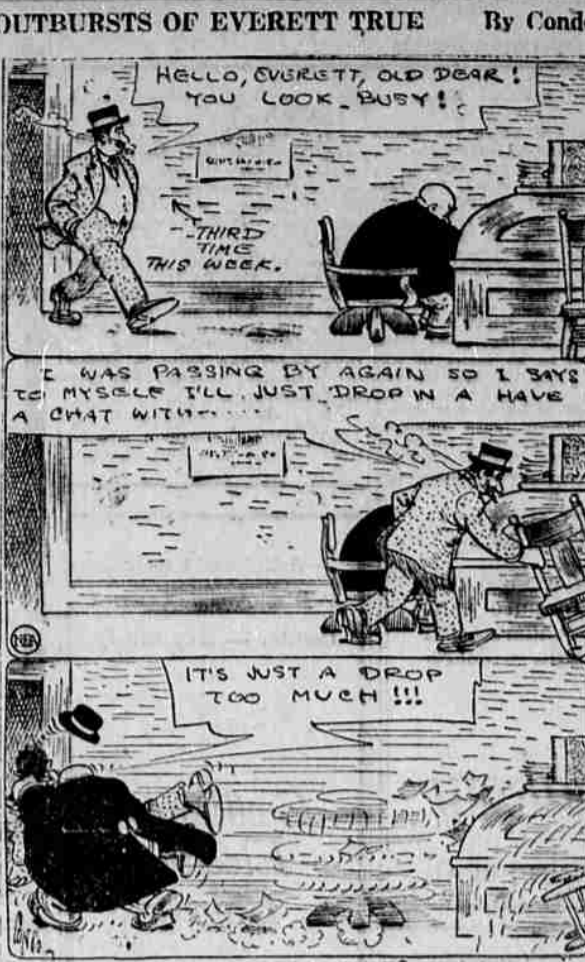

OPPOSED TO 'SCALPERS' WASHINGTON (Special) - Attempts of 'scalpers' to buy up for cash at large discounts adjusted compensation certificates from world war veterans will be met by drastic action.

A statement to this effect was made here by officials of the Veterans' bureau to representatives of the American Legion.

Attention of the bureau was called to an advertisement in which a veteran offered to sell his certificate 'to the highest cash bidder.'

Bureau officials were also advised of reports that a huge financial pool is being organized in a leading middle western city for the purpose of buying up compensation certificates in the hope of reaping huge profits at the expense of the veteran and of the government.

The 'scalper' it was pointed out will in all probability find himself, if he buys up such a certificate, with only a non-negotiable 'scrap of paper.' The government has no intention of permitting wholesale 'scalping' of certificates, inquiry at the veterans' bureau and among members of congress revealed.

The law was carefully drawn, it was said, to protect the veteran and his dependent and to throw all possible safeguards around their interests. Section 606 of the law will prevent payment by the government to any other than the veteran himself or his dependents or beneficiaries designated only by the director of the veterans' bureau.

This section is as follows: 'No right to payment under the provisions of this title shall be assignable or serve as security for any loan. Any assignment or loan made in violation of the provisions of this section shall be held void. The director shall not make any payments under this title to any person other than the dependent or such representative of the dependent as the director shall by regulation prescribe.'

All parties are agreed, that persons who attempt to purchase adjusted service certificates will find themselves the losers.

TWIN FALLS, Idaho (Special) - Twin Falls, the Snake river canyon from which the city of Twin Falls takes its name and which heretofore has been accessible only at the end of a long and difficult ascent of canyon wall, will be brought within easy reach of tourists visitors by means of a trail

to be built by Twin Falls post of the American Legion.

BOSTON, Mass. (Special) - Governor Cox of Massachusetts recently signed a state bill which gives widows of World War veterans, and their children under 18 years, \$12 a month whether the veteran's death was traceable to war service or not. Under the old law the dependent was obliged to prove that the veteran's death was traceable to service. Leo A. Sullivan, state adjutant of the American Legion which has been agitating for the bill for some time, was present when Governor Cox signed the bill.

SHANGHAI, China (Special) - Gen. Frederick Ward of the American Legion post of Shanghai, China, will cooperate with Chinese officials in the reception and entertainment of the American Legion at the annual round the world (Rt) when they land at Shanghai from their 500 mile jump over the water from Kuan-tung, Japan.

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (Special) - Gen. Robert Lee Bullard, famous war hero of the second battle of the Marne, has accepted an invitation to address the Department of Alabama of the American Legion July 4th at the annual convention of the legion to be held in Tuscaloosa, Alabama, July 2-4-5. Gen. Bullard was awarded the distinguished service medal and received decorations from France, Belgium and Italy in recognition of his services in the war.

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (Special) - A warning against the unauthorized solicitation of funds with which to purchase radio equipment for disabled veterans was recently broadcast by the American Legion post of St. Louis. Numerous reports of such unauthorized solicitation throughout the country came to the notice of the legion which announced that disabled veterans are being provided with radio equipment from funds of the United States Veterans' bureau.

RAIL ACTION PROTESTED BAKER, Ore. - The report has reached Baker that the G. W. E. & N. company has completed abolishing the position of ticket agent at Baker, La Grande and Pendleton. This work then will devolve upon the telegraph operators at the local stations. It was understood that Pendleton business men were up in arms about the change and a protest has been sent in from La Grande.

RULES GIVEN TO LESSEN ELECTRIC SHOCK DANGER

CHICAGO (AP). - The rules for first aid in cases of high voltage shock are based on the fact that the victim's lungs become paralyzed, and success in saving life depends upon keeping up artificial respiration until normal breathing is resumed. While MacLachlan of the National Electric Light association, told the American Medical association's convention today.

'Since cases are on record of lives saved after three and one-half hours of artificial respiration, four hours of effort are recommended before artificial respiration is given up,' he said. 'The rules are as follows: 'The victim is cleared from the current, either by shutting off the current, or pulling him away with the aid of rubber gloves, dry clothing, or sticks of wood, to serve as non-conductors. If it is necessary to cut the wire, a hatchet or implement with a wooden handle should be used and the operator should turn his face away to avoid the flash. The patient is then laid face down, with one arm up and the other supporting his face so that the mouth and nose are free for breathing. Artificial respiration should be begun at once, while an assistant loosens the clothing necessary, holds ammonia to the victim's nose and keeps him as warm as possible. If the victim must be moved, this should be done in a reclining position, and the artificial respiration should be kept up. After by resuming breathing, he should be watched and if he stops, artificial respiration should be resumed. This prone pressure method is that in which the man applying first aid straddles the patient and presses both hands on the small of the victim's back, releasing the pressure rhythmically every two or three seconds, and imitating his own breathing as much as possible.'

BETTER HIGHWAYS NEED

BAKER, Ore.—Representatives from Cornucopia and Unity, together with a number of local citizens, met with William Duby, chairman and Judge W. H. Malone of the state highway commission Sunday night relative to state action to improve the Baker-Cornucopia and Baker-Bridgeport-Unity highways.

It was pointed out that the roads from these points to Baker are in very poor condition and that many prefer to trade in Idaho. It was agreed to appoint two representatives to present a formal request to the highway commission at the next regular session the last of July.
