Annual State Association Convention to Be Held at Albany, Oregon, for Two Days.

Monday the Annual State Osteopathic association will open its convention at Albany with suitable ceremonies to commemorate the completion of fifty years of osteopathy which was announced to the world by Andrew Taylor Still on June 23, 1874.

From a humble beginning in a two room college building with 18 students, osteopathy has grown to have eight large colleges and 9000 practicing physicians located in all parts of the globe.

Dr. G. E. Holt of Pendleton, the state president, will deliver the golden jubilee address and preside at the sessions, which will be addressed by many nationally known osteopathic physicians and surgeons.

TOKYO, (AP)—The Department of Education is already making plans for the third Pan-Pacific Scientific conference, to be held in Tokyo in 1926.

Boy Tells of shooting. CONDON. — Mysterious shooting took place last week on the Ajax road, about eight miles west of Condon. Municipal Housing Scheme Falls in Irish Village DUBLIN, (AP) — Various Irish local bodies have carried out schemes for the housing of workmen. In Tralee, Co. Kerry, ten houses have been erected at a cost to the ratepayers of about \$12,000. Applicants were sought at a cost of \$1.50 weekly, but they refused to pay more than 50 cents and threatened that they would permit nobody to pay a higher rent. The council refused to let for less, and has asked permission of the government to sell the houses at public auction.
