Automotive Revenue Is Discussed By Sam Kozer

SALEM, Ore. (Special)—During the month of May, said Sam A. Kozer, secretary of state, today in a statement from his department, there were 6381 passenger cars, 636 trucks, 194 motorcycles, 20 motor vehicle dealers, 931 chauffeurs and 3280 motor vehicle operators licensed, from which the fees aggregated \$211,997.59. During the corresponding month in the year 1923 there were 7999 passenger cars, 675 trucks, 297 motorcycles, 29 motor vehicle dealers, 1923 chauffeurs and 3419 motor vehicle operators licensed, the total fees therefrom being \$226,411.50. These figures show a slight falling off in the month of May, 1924, from May 1923, registrations as well as in the aggregate fees received. However, the total registrations up to May 31, 1924, show 26,340 more passenger cars registered than during the corresponding period in the year 1923; also, an excess of 1427 motor trucks; making total motor vehicle registrations of May 31, 1924, of 28,176 more than during the same period of the year 1923. The aggregate of the fees from the activities in connection with the licensing of motor vehicles thus far during the year 1924 show receipts of \$719,575.53 in excess of those during 1923. So far for 1924 license fees aggregating \$4,152,294.53 have been received as against \$3,531,729 during the same period of 1923. Taking into consideration the fact that the sales of motor vehicles thus far during 1924 have not been as great as during the corresponding period of 1923, yet, in view of the activities in motor vehicle registrations during the last half of 1923, we can safely estimate a total of 150,000 motor car registrations during 1924, from which the license fees should aggregate well into \$4,750,000. GRAIN MEN TO FORM COMPANY

Great Sales Consolidation Plan Submitted to American Farm Bureau Federation.

CHICAGO (By the Associated Press)—Grain farmers would own, finance and control five large Chicago grain firms and 5000 cooperative elevators under a plan submitted by the executive committee of the American Farm Bureau which will shortly name the committee, headed by President Bradford, for its study.

CHICAGO (By the Associated Press)—A definite plan under which five large grain concerns and 5000 cooperative elevators would come under producer control was formally submitted to the executive committee of the American Farm Bureau Federation yesterday. The formal announcement of the formation was made:

"A plan contemplating the acquisition of the mechanical and managerial facilities of five large grain concerns and 5000 cooperative elevators has been presented to the American Farm Bureau Federation.

This proposes that the international grain marketing sales agency resulting become grower-owned and financed and controlled.

"This plan was presented to the executive committee of the American Farm Bureau Federation this week after a four-day discussion and was adopted authorizing the president of the federation to appoint a committee of which he is to be the chairman of such size and personnel as by him shall be decided for the purpose of determining the practicability of the producers undertaking the ownership of grain facilities and processing methods by which it may be successfully acquired for the advantage of the producers.

STONE ORDERS INVESTIGATION

Federal Probe into Gasoline Situation in United States Next on Books.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government's intention to go to the bottom of the whole gasoline price situation, probably through the courts, was indicated Friday by Attorney General Stone.

Inquiries instituted by the federal trade commission and the department of justice are to form the basis of the proceedings which, it was stated, will be started by the federal government. Results of the commission's study of the gasoline tax and the motor vehicle license fees are all transferred to the state highway fund with the exception of such sums as are

Confer With States. As the next step, Mr. Stone will hold a conference early in July with attorney generals of certain states whose identity is withheld for the present. After that conference, which Mr. Stone said, would provide a comprehensive survey of the whole situation, the department of justice will make known the character of proceedings it intends to employ.

Whether the department has questioned some semblance of price maintenance arrangements was not stated. Mention was made by Mr. Stone in a formal statement however, that part of the department's inquiry had been directed toward determination whether the several standard oil companies had obeyed the federal court dissolution decree of 1911.

When the department completes the preparatory study of the gasoline question, it expects to be able to lay before the public a complete picture of the oil industry from production through refining and distribution.

necessary in the administration of the motor vehicle laws which is not in excess of 4 per cent of the total fees. This expense includes the cost of the plates, the maintenance of the title and registration by the secretary of state, the registration of motor vehicle operators, and all the work incident to the various provisions of the motor vehicle law.

Assuming that the gasoline tax will return during the year \$2,750,000 and the net receipts from motor vehicle licenses will be \$4,000,000, there will be a total of \$7,350,000 available from such sources for the state highway fund out of which there must first be paid the bonded obligation falling due during the year not in excess of \$2,200,000. This leaves substantially \$5,000,000 for the general maintenance and upkeep of the highways and for such further road extension and improvements as are contemplated by the state highway commission in carrying out the general road program of the state.
