Hawaii Seeks to Preserve Birds of Outlying Islands

HONOLULU (AP) — The advocacy of petitioning the federal government to place all outlying islands about the Hawaiian group under the jurisdiction and control of the territory has been the subject of conference between Governor Wallace R. Farrington and other officials.

The conference was held at the suggestion of Dr. Herbert H. Gregory, director of the Hawaiian museum. Gerrit P. Wilder, federal bird warden with jurisdiction over the outlying islands, has agreed to furnish Governor Farrington with information regarding proper action that might be taken by the territory.

Scientists interested in bird and vegetable life on the outlying islands have made explorations during the past year and unearthed many significant and valuable facts regarding the remains of an ancient civilization. To protect and build up the existing bird and vegetable life is the desire behind the movement to place the islands under the jurisdiction of the territory.

Famous French Aviator Instructs Japanese Army

TOKIO (AP) — Georges Barbot, French flying wizard, until recently holder of the world's endurance record for glider flying, has arrived in Japan to demonstrate for the army the most recent advances in aviation. He is to be attached to one of the army's largest airplane production centres to teach Japanese builders the latest principles of airplane construction.

Barbot brought with him two planes, one the tiny "avionette" carrying a 12-horsepower Daimler engine, with which he flew across

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Philippine Chess Champion Is Illegitimate Nativ Day

MANILA. (AP) — Datu Alp, a Moro of Ramin, Lanao province, is chess champion of the Philippines, having won that distinction in a recent tournament at Cebu by defeating Leopoldo Lafente, a Spaniard, who held the title. In the tournament Alp, an American, Spaniard, Christian Filipino and Moro.

Datu Alp, who is 46 years of age, can neither read nor write the Arabic or any other alphabet, yet he displays remarkable keenness in defense and is quick to take advantage of the slightest error in judgment on the part of his opponent.

When playing the game Alp smokes cigarettes and sings continuously, his songs being mostly from the Koran. He has played chess from early childhood with his father, champion chess player of his province, an avowed and a data of much political and religious power.
