La Follette cause came through the Cleveland convention with enhanced prestige. INSANITY IS INCREASING

Dr. J. Ivan Dufur, professor of nervous diseases at the Philadelphia College of Osteopathy and Surgery speaking today before the Oregon Osteopathic Association at Albany, started the assembly by quoting statistics to show the astonishing increase of insanity in the United States. According to Dr. Dufur, "insanity is not the only disease which is rapidly increasing in this country in spite of every effort of the medical profession to control it. The rate of increase of insanity is fully as great as that of cancer and no medical or surgical cure has been found for either," says the doctor. "The remedy for this alarming situation lies, not so much in the curing of those unfortunate individuals who are already in institutions as in the prevention of new cases by instituting proper treatment early."

Auto intoxication is the cause of most nervousness according to the researches of Dr. Dufur and he advocates overcoming the "self poisoning" by putting the body machinery in proper working order by osteopathic adjustments so that it can automatically eliminate its own waste products.

Chinese Eager to Invest Money in Philippines

MANILA (AP).—American investments in the Philippines increased slightly during the year 1923 compared with 1922. Chinese more than doubled their investments over 1922, while Filipino investments slumped by practically two-thirds compared with 1922, according to figures compiled by Fidel A. Reyes, director of the bureau of commerce and industry.

During the year 1923 there were registered 284 corporations and partnerships of which 56 were American with an aggregate capital of \$1,116,000, compared with 49 the previous year with a capital of \$1,050,000.

The Older Woman.

To look younger than one's age is not necessarily to look more attractive. Each age has its own fascination, and to jettison the charm of maturity for the fata Morgana of a spurious youthfulness is to sell one's own blight.

But, to make the most of this rare charm, a certain amount of wisdom must be acquired in the use of adjuncts to beauty.

Often the woman approaching middle age becomes panicky—either believes that art and artifice are no longer for her, and declines into a pallid and nondescript obscurity, or goes to the other extreme and plunges into a cosmetic orgy in the effort to retain the outward appearance of youth. Both extremes are wrong. There is no reason why the older woman should not use cosmetics in moderation to improve her appearance, but she will only defeat her purpose and add years to her age if she makes up in a glaring imitation of youth.

The reason for this is obvious. Cosmetics, apart, it is not natural for an older woman to have as high a color in her cheeks or lips as a young girl. Therefore, since the principle of artistic make-up is to adhere closely to nature as possible, it is unattractive for a mature woman to display cherry lips and bright pink cheeks, unless these attributes have withstood the years and belong to her naturally.

What rules of make-up then shall the mature woman follow? Obviously, she is of all types, blonde, medium or brunette, so that no more than for the younger woman can any one type of make-up be laid down. Let her select the rouge and powder suited to her type, as discussed previously in

these columns. For the blonde, pink, mandarin, or salmon, or Ponceau powder. For the brunette, Ashes of Rose, rouge, Rachel or Ponceau and cream powders. It is for her a question of reducing the emphasis. From, say, forty or forty-five on, good taste demands the subdued use of color on the cheeks and lips.

It is extremely important for the older woman to apply rouge where her own natural color is. As a general rule, the color recedes as one grows older, and is found lower on the cheeks than in early youth. The rouge must be very carefully applied and shaded at the edges so as to leave no hard lines. By all means go to the window when doing this, so that the uncomplaining light of day will guide you as to the amount of rouge to apply.

There are some women who find as they approach middle age that, far from losing their color, they have a tendency to become more florid in complexion. This somewhat is accentuated to an embarrassing degree after eating, dancing, excitement, or exercise. To tone down this unbecoming flush to a more delicate color, a best powder has been originated, which bears the romantic name of Vert Opinel. While this powder has a green tone, it is of the utmost delicate water green, or the palest Nile, such as you might get in very filmy gauze, and in fact the effect of its use is to pass a very becoming veil over the too-flushed face.
