TWO PREMIERS REACH ACCORD

Allied Chiefs to Meet in London in Mid-July to Decide Upon Dawes' Report Operation.

LONDON (By the Associated Press)—The prime minister, Ramsay MacDonald, and M. Herriot, the French premier, have agreed provided there is no objection from the other allies, that an allied conference shall be held in London not later than mid-July for the purpose of definitely deciding on the procedure to be adopted for putting the Dawes report into execution.

What is possibly of still greater import is that two premiers will visit Geneva together at the opening of the assembly of the league of nations in September next.

TRIBUTE PAID TO DECEASED

Union County Bar Conducts Ceremony in Honor of late Judge T. H. Crawford.

As a last tribute to a fellow member of the bar, memorial services as were held at the court house Saturday afternoon in honor of the late Judge T. H. Crawford.

In the old court room in which the judge had so often appeared his fellow lawyers who knew him best paid their final respects to the memory of the departed.

Circuit Judge J. W. Knowles opened the ceremonies with an eloquent tribute to the deceased and read two telegrams which had been received at the time of Judge Crawford's death. The telegrams read:

Hon. J. W. Knowles, La Grande, Oregon: The members of this court unite in expressing their appreciation of the character and services of the Thomas H. Crawford. He was an ideal lawyer, a genial gentleman, and a useful citizen, whose death was a distinct loss to his profession and to the community.—Thomas A. McBride, Chief Justice Supreme Court.

Robert S. Eakin, La Grande: I regret I will be unable to attend memorial services. During the twenty years I knew Judge Crawford he impressed me as an earnest advocate, fearless opponent and a good citizen. He was kind, cordial and true to his friends and left behind a spotless name which is the greatest of all monuments.

The state and the bar have suffered a great loss.—A. C. Spencer, General Council O. W. R. & N. Eulogistic addresses were delivered by George Cochran, chairman of the memorial committee, R. J. Green, Colon Eberhard, H. E. Dixon, Ed Wright, R. J. Kitchen, H. L. Hess and Judge Frank Wilson of Indier. A resolution was passed expressing the grief of the Circuit Court of Union county and the members of the bar, which was recorded on the journals of the court and a copy sent to Judge Crawford's son, Clarence H. Crawford, himself a member of the bar.

Greet Delegates. Senator Samuel M. Ralston will be placed in nomination, Indiana delegates decided today. William Gibbs McAdoo today greeted delegates from nine western states, speaking to a vast crowd from his hotel balcony. He said the progressive democracy would recover the American government from privilege and debauchery.

Facing the cheering delegations from the balcony of his uptown hotel, McAdoo told them his enemies were spreading word that after a few ballots they would turn from him. "There were cries of 'No, No' from the crowd which choked Fourth avenue for a block. 'I know you did not come here to betray a trust,' McAdoo continued. 'We are last ditchers,' cried one delegate from Oregon, amid cheers. 'We are not only last ditchers,' McAdoo replied, 'but we are democracy triumphant.'

Klan Plank Discussed.

Senator Cummings, in speaking of the platform, today said that supporters of a strong anti-klan plank were disposed to be reasonable and this, with the statement of Tom Taggart, of Indiana, that the platform scoring the secret organizations without specifically naming the Ku Klux Klan would be satisfactory, gave rise to the belief in some quarters that a plank denouncing the Ku Klux Klan without specifically naming it would be drawn in the platform.
