able luck due to the cold and  
cloudy weather prevailing. The fish  
will not readily respond to the lure  
of the flies like that.

the folks at the Forks Tuesday.  
Their son Kenneth, drove the team  
taking them to the Smith place.  
They walked the rest of the way.  
Miss Ida O. Hunter returned  
home from the Springs Tuesday  
morning.

### Deer Sighted.

Two large deer were peacefully  
feeding in a field near Clarence  
Vanorder's house the other morn-  
ing. One carried a large set of  
antlers, which made a most beau-  
tiful sight.

An electric storm passed the  
Park and the Forks from west to  
east Monday evening. The light-  
ning struck one tree.  
The forest service pack train  
went up Buck creek ridge drive-  
way with a load of supplies for  
the gang of men working on the  
trail.

Joel Spencer and John Jacobs,  
Union business men, after a cold  
and wet hike in the South Fork  
angling for trout, stopped at the  
"Big Log Cabin" telling of their  
luck while sipping a cup of hot  
coffee. They are two of the regu-  
lar sportsmen that frequent the  
creek very often during the warm  
months. And as a general  
rule they are lucky fishermen.

Paul Ellis, Catherine creek for-  
est ranger, from Cove, made a busi-  
ness call Tuesday. He was on his  
way to the range station at the  
Big Meadows, where he will attend  
the counting of the sheep going to  
the reserve.

### Snow Reported

Tuesday morning 18 inches of  
snow was reported covering the Big  
Meadows at the foot of Meadow  
mountain.

Wednesday morning a fisherman  
caught a large steelhead salmon  
close to Buck creek, on the North  
Fork. This is first caught this  
year that far up the creek. There  
are but very few salmon above the  
Thompson place.

ing house and doing the farm work  
while their father and mother, Mr.  
and Mrs. Clarence Vanorder were  
visiting here this week.

Reports state that John Wallace  
Boyle, 6 year old pioneer of this

is hoped that the next news will  
be a denial of this report. For Mr.  
Boyle has many friends—in fact he  
is everybody's friend—and all are  
anxious as to his welfare.

Dave Lloyd and family from Cove  
are camped on the creek for an  
outing aiming for trout and sal-  
mon. They took a hike up the  
South Fork Wednesday morning.

S. E. Miller, sheep owner, was a  
guest here for dinner Wednesday.  
Mr. Miller was looking over the  
range for his sheep that are on the  
South Fork.

Three Indians of the Umatilla  
reservation, passed the Park, ex-  
ploring the country. They were  
young fellows who had never visit-  
ed Catherine creek before.

Mr. Ellis returned from the Big  
Meadows Wednesday reporting a  
snowfall of about three inches dur-  
ing the night.

A bunch of 255 sheep were taken  
up and put in Mr. Allen's band on  
the South Fork.

Clarence Vanorder caught a fine  
salmon just below the second cross-  
ing Wednesday.

Mrs. W. Wigglesworth of Union,  
accompanied by a visiting daughter  
of Portland, Mrs. Myra Getchell,  
are coming Thursday by stage to  
the Park. They will visit with Mrs.  
Wigglesworth's son and daughter-  
in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Wig-  
glesworth.

At Ruby and James Rose of La  
Grande, came down from the Min-  
am river recently. They have been  
prospecting up there for some time.  
Mr. Rose had found some very  
good ore last fall while herding  
sheep, but this time, could not find  
the ledge on account of the snow.  
They report about six feet of snow  
at the head of the Minam. But  
they run onto a fine ledge of gold  
quartz of which the gold can be  
seen within the ledge.

## \$22,000,000 Saved on June Debt Interest

average of almost four per cent  
interest.  
While the cut in the total debt  
brought about by this one opera-  
tion appears as a drop in the buck-  
et when considered alongside the  
national debt of more than \$21-  
000,000,000, treasury officials point  
with satisfaction to the amount of  
interest that would have to be  
paid, and that means taxes to be  
raised, provided there was no re-  
duction in the debt. The treasury  
has issued only \$150,000,000 in new  
securities while it has retired and  
destroyed a total of \$521,000,000 in  
outstanding debt.

"It is this steady biting off of  
the great national debt that means  
lower taxes in the future," a treas-  
ury official said. He added that in  
the last three years the treasury  
had been able on every occasion to  
retire more securities than it  
has issued in each fiscal operation,  
and the great debt, 99 per cent of  
which resulted directly from world  
war expenditures, is gradually be-  
ing whittled down.
