Law of Conduct in Theaters Laid Down by German Judge

BERLIN (AP)—A Berlin judge has formulated the limits of approval or disapproval of a play by a spectator as follows:

"If the management makes no preliminary announcement to the contrary, it must be assumed that it agrees tacitly to the old established custom that everybody who is so inclined may criticize the performance by sign of disapproval. Of course, the means adopted for expressing permissible artistic criticism must conform with middle-European customs. House keys and whistles are forbidden, for in the last analysis the theater is no field of battle where brute force decides the issue."

STEEL SHAFT CLUBS BANNED

British Golfing Authorities Differ with Americans Regarding Club's Shaft Structure.

LONDON (AP)—The acceptance of the use of the steel-shafted golf club by the governing body of the game in America meets with no approval in Great Britain. For this there are many explanations. In the first place, there is the inherent British disinclination to accept anything new, but beyond this reason for repelling innovation there is, in this case, a general feeling that the Americans are always trying to make the game of golf easier and more mechanical. Consequently the British feel that it is up to them, who nurtured the game in its infancy, to see that it keeps the character of its youth.

It was this feeling which led the royal and ancient law-making body to forbid the use of the punched and cut-faced iron which the American entrants in last year's open championship brought over. If anyone brings steel-shafted clubs from America to this year's championships it will be a waste of cargo-space, because the governing body is certain to bar them.

Just before the amateur championships began at St. Andrews last month, the rules of golf committee posted a notice in the clubhouse "deploring" the use in the game of golf of "implements which have never been associated with it." The notice was polite, but intended, no doubt, to make those who failed to heed its moral lesson just a little bit ashamed of themselves. It read as follows:

"The Rules of Golf committee hope that golfers, before making use of abnormal methods of play or of abnormal implements, will earnestly consider whether they are acting in conformity with the spirit of the rules of golf, and in particular with the regulations governing the form and make of golf clubs."

The committee considers it to be deplorable that players, instead of trying to master the use of golf clubs, should endeavor to overcome the difficulties of the game by using implements which have never been associated with it."

At the time of its appearance, the people of St. Andrews interpreted the notice as a hint to H. H. Gillies, a well known British amateur, to give up the "Bitter Tower" tree, some six to ten inches



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high, which have excited much comment ever since he began using them last winter. Mr. Gillies took the hint and fell back upon the ordinary little club of steel and for his tee the next morning. Anyone who has followed the discussion by British golfers and sport writers upon every American change in the game, knows that the notice is meant for them also.

Self-Help Student System Grows in German Universities

GOETTINGEN, Germany. (AP)—The self-help student, unknown in Germany before the war, is increasing in the universities because of existing economic conditions. It is estimated that one-half of the student body of the country receive

less than \$15 a month each from home, so that the American custom of part earning by college students became a necessity.

The universities and allied organizations have taken keen interest in the matter, establishing employment bureaus, tailor shops, shoe shops, hot-houses, book stores, work-

laundries, printing shops and even small factories where students are employed in off hours. The usual pay is one meal for an hour of work.

At Goettingen University, for instance, 1,000 students earn their noon-day meal and about 500 their supper by manual and clerical work.
