SECOND DAY OF MEET ON

"Osteopathic Is Body Mechanic" Is Assertion at Albany Convention.

ALBANY, Ore. (Special to the Observer)—Dr. Gerding, president of the College of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons, of Los Angeles, at the state convention here today, deplored confusion in the public mind of osteopathy and its influence. This is being overcome by a high standard of osteopathic colleges. Four of seven are now giving six years above high school and granting a Bachelor of Science degree after four years and Doctor of Osteopathy after six years.

Two osteopathic hospitals have just been completed and, with an 150 bed osteopathic section in the county hospital under an osteopathic staff, these such hospitals now exist in Los Angeles.

Dr. Gerding spoke on osteopathic treatment of nervous diseases.

ALBANY, Ore. (Special)—Dr. Arthur Becker, dean of the Kirksville College of Osteopathy and Surgery, speaking today before the State Osteopathic association advocated adopting a plan of health insurance which would include the monthly overhauling of the body machine by an osteopathic mechanic with the view of keeping the body mechanism in proper adjustment.

The old proverb of "A stitch in time" was stressed by the doctor who pointed out that many serious diseases are painless until nearly hopeless.

Says the doctor "Cancer, Bright's Disease, diabetes and tuberculosis are all diseases that are painless until they are so firmly entrenched in the body as to make treatment difficult."

By the monthly body overhaul advocated by Dr. Becker, these and other conditions would be discovered in time so that proper treatment could be instituted and a much lower death rate from disease would result.

While the doctor did not advocate the adoption of the old Chinese system of "pay when well and no pay when sick" yet he believes that there are many good ideas embodied in such a system and that the adoption of his plan would increase the average length of life in the United States by ten years.

Socialist-Labor Candidate Has One Presidential Plank. PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—Frank T. Johns, a Portland carpenter, who was nominated as candidate for president of the United States by the Socialist-Labor party at a recent convention in New York, is planning a speaking tour to spread the doctrines of his organization, but he does not expect that his party will send a man to the White House this year.

"In order to carry on a campaign we must have a candidate," he said. "In this as in all our campaigns we will stress not the qualifications or the life of any individual but the principles of the organization."

He said the campaign would be on a one-plank platform which he stated: "Complete surrender of the capitalist class and substitution of a socialist system for the present capitalist system."

Ex-Sheriff Anderson Gives Tanlac Credit
