plus products more, it might have visualized world conditions and courageously assumed the part of a great nation. It might have reduced living costs, redeemed pledges to the soldier, followed a definite domestic program, and adopted a broad and statesmanlike foreign policy but, even then, it would have availed it nothing with its carnival of corruption.

"The least that the American people expect of their public servants is common honesty. They will forgive their passivity, overlook their indiscretions, and, too often, forget their impotency, but to them corruption is inexorable, graft is indefensible."

Referring to senate inquiries, Senator Harrison was unapologetic in his criticisms of former Secretaries Denby and Fall, former Attorney General Daugherty, Charles E. Forbes, former head of the Veterans bureau and former Senator Newberry of Michigan. He paid high tribute to Senator Thomas J. Walsh of Montana, prosecutor of the oil inquiry and others connected with the arduous investigations.

"Deceit them as they will, the American people know that it was these investigations—conducted by Democrats but through Republican committees—that sent Albert B. Fall to Texas, Rivers a disgraced man, it was these investigations that compelled Edwin Denby's retirement from the cabinet. It was these investigations that drove Daugherty back to Washington Court House. It was these investigations that caused conspirators against their government to take to their heels rather than tell the truth. It was these investigations that pointed to the immoral acts of Forbes and Daugherty, scandals in the Veterans bureau. It was these investigations that put a republican congressionary behind bars and lashed Newberry from the senate. It was these investigations that informed the American public that the first official act of Calvin Coolidge was the appointment of a private secretary who had traded and trafficked in public patronage. It was these investigations that led a republican senate to convict its own republican national committee for 'framing' a democratic senator because he dared to do the right."

Scores G. O. P.

Comparing the investigations into Democratic and republican administrations, Senator Harrison said it was "not graft alone that offers in the two administrations such happy comparisons."

"During these little more than three years," he said, "we have seen the present administration float along, tossed by every current, fanned by every breeze, without purpose, program or policy. Upon a thousand issues they have hunched the white flag of surrender."

Senator Harrison declared that nothing in "baroque or opera bouffe" was comparable to the "scene recently enacted at Cleveland in the efforts of the Silent Sphinx of the economy to edit and expatriate those republican senators who dared to oppose his mandate."

"They dared to vote an investigation of a number of the president's official family and they are penalized for their decency," he said.

By every device known to trained emulphors, by every subtle process of ingenuitism in the republican nominee, in true political fashion, sought to divert himself from his former comrades in arms. The plan is obvious; the plot is futile. Neither the president nor his Suburban army, headed by General Butler and Sergeant Stearns can conceal the only fact that the Cleveland convention was the most highly organized, most-ridiculous and obnoxious ever held in America. The American people will not be deceived.

"The American people will know that they are dealing with a system that even though Hanna, Quay and Fenwick are dead, their spirits go marching on in the personages of the Three Musketeers of present day republicanism—Butler, Stearns and Slump."

Turning to a discussion of the Mellon tax proposal, Senator Harrison asserted that it was conceived in the interest of privilege.

"What is this Mellon tax? It is a tax on the poor. It is a tax on the 5,000,000 income tax payers in America 21 per cent of the total reduction. The temporary chairman declared

to where Miss Gray lived.

After leaving their camping site and going to Union, where they stopped at the Mires place, Mrs. Cook testified that Scott, Noble and the girl arrived there and that at that time the girl was drunk. She also said that Miss Gray took a "swallow" of liquor from a bottle, three-quarters full, which she had with her.

Mr. Cook, in his testimony, said that Frank Birch and Fred Mires were also along on the trip. Later testimony also was to the effect that Kate Conley, of Elgin, was with the fishing party.

Saw Bottle in Noble's Car.

When questioned about whether any liquor was in Noble's car when Catherine Creek, Mr. Cook stated that he saw one bottle of moonshine whiskey in it in Noble's car. He stated that Scott and Noble were both slightly sick in the evening when they were at the Mires home in Union. He said that Scott seemed sober up the creek and that Noble had a liquor odor on his breath.

Others who testified this morning were Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Mires, Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Mires and Fred Murexy. G. D. Scott had been subpoenaed but was not present. Their testimony bore out the earlier testimony nearly in every detail.

Her father failed to arrive in La Grande last evening and funeral arrangements are still pending. The body is at the Bohlenkamp chapel.

Dr. E. J. Schuyler, of Union, also testified to the effect that he had been called to the Mires home. He said that a strong odor of liquor pervaded the atmosphere at the home and also said that one other fellow there, whom he could not identify, was drunk.

Dr. W. T. Phy, of Hot Lake, who examined the girl while she was at the sanatorium before and after death, announced that the girl's stomach had been sent to the state laboratories at Portland for positive examination. He announced that it would be impossible to secure an absolute diagnosis of her death until the report from Portland arrived.
