High Altitude Results In Fantastic Baseball

SALT LAKE CITY (AP).—Surprising believed to be unprecedented in organized baseball, a total of 244 hits in a series of seven games between the San Francisco and Salt Lake City clubs of the Pacific Coast league played at the local park recently, left the fans gasping.

An explanation other than the fallibility of pitchers was sought, since the batting orgy was participated in generally by players on both teams and affected virtually all the twirlers of the rival clubs. J. Cecil Alter, chief of the weather bureau here, hazarded the opinion that the high altitude of Salt Lake City, 4200 feet, had something to do with it. The ball finds less resistance in the rarified atmosphere of the Utah metropolis than in the sea level cities along the coast, the forecaster said, and the players are in better physical condition.

San Francisco won six out of the seven slugs with a total of 150 hits and 100 runs. Salt Lake City chalked up 114 hits and 70 runs.

They were Gene Sarazen, Macdonald Smith, Walter Hagen, Jim Barnes and Gilbert Nicholls. Of the American starters only Al Espinosa of California failed, cards of 158 and under qualified the entrants.

Lighthouse Keeper's Rabbits Undermine Government Property

SEATTLE (AP).—Rabbits, which have defied the United States government by "digging everything except clams" and undermining "everything except the lighthouse," on Smith Island, a small one in the Strait of Juan de Fuca at the entrance of Puget Sound, will soon have a hard time to exist. Poison bait is to be scattered about the island in an effort to bring the rodent pest under control.

Several varieties of rabbits were brought to Smith Island 25 years ago by a lighthouse keeper who raised them for Seattle markets, but the island later was made a bird refuge, barring all firearms, and the rabbits multiplied to thousands.

Barren have been installed on a water tower and other government structures to keep them from toppling as a result of the burrowing.

Famous Zoo To Reopen

HAMBURG, Germany. (AP).—After having been closed since 1920 for financial reasons, the famous zoo at Stellingen, near Hamburg, founded by Karl Hagenbeck, in 1867, has been reopened. This is chiefly due to the initiative of Henry and Lorenz Hagenbeck, the two sons of the famous showman. Their greatest task was that of replenishing the zoo with species of beasts of prey from India and Africa that had been killed off during the war to save food.

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TEACHERS AT SCHOOLS MANY

MONMOUTH, Ore. (Special to the Observer).—The enrollment for the first week of the State Normal school was 336 and for the first six weeks there will be about 500. The report came from Ashland of 100 teachers are in attendance there and fifty attending summer school at Pendleton. This brings the enrollment of teachers attending summer school over one thousand.

President Landers called for all those who had come from eastern Oregon to hold up their hands recently and from the number of hands held up it showed that there was a large number of teachers from that section of the state.

Miss Ida Roberts went to Corvallis on Thursday to spend six weeks in her practice teaching. Miss Roberts is well known in Union county, as she was at one time editor of the North Powder News, and for the past few years has been teaching in the rural schools in lower co. Miss Roberts expects to finish her course at the State Normal this year.

The state law requires that each teacher take six months of practice teaching but owing to overcrowded conditions and lack of room and the large number of teachers, about eighty could not take their practice teaching. The state room is overcrowded and is running on short rations, both as to room and teachers.

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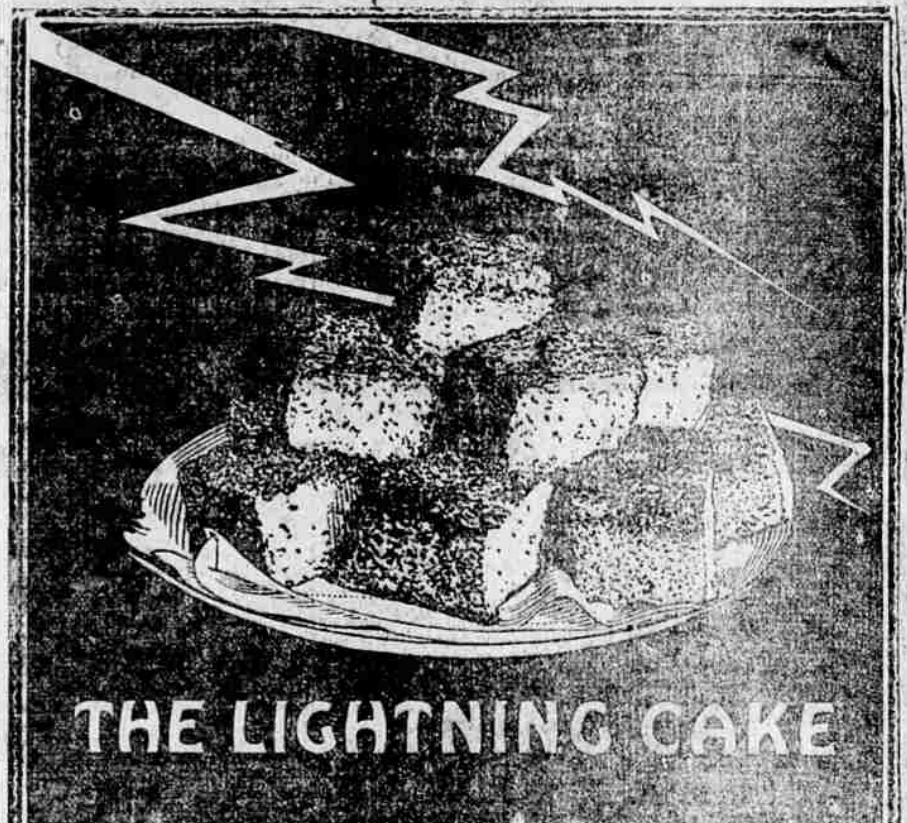

THE LIGHTNING CAKE

HOW TO MAKE THE LIGHTNING CAKE

(Use level measurements for all materials)

- 1/2 cup milk
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup Amaizo
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 cups flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 3 tsp. Royal Baking Powder

Put milk into bowl; add eggs, Amaizo, sugar and vanilla; mix well. Sift flour, salt and baking powder together; add to the liquid ingredients; mix thoroughly. Spread about one inch thick on shallow greased pan; sprinkle with granulated sugar mixed with cinnamon and chopped almonds; bake in hot oven (375°F.) about 15 minutes. When cool cut into squares and serve for luncheon or afternoon tea.

For variety one cup chopped nuts or fruit can be added to the dry ingredients.



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
