CHURCH PLANS MEMORIAL FOR BISHOP TUTTLE

ST. LOUIS (AP)—A national memorial to the late Daniel S. Tuttle, Episcopal bishop of Missouri for almost 40 years, and presiding bishop of the Episcopal church of the United States for more than 20 years, is to be erected in St. Louis in connection with the Christ church cathedral, Bishop Tuttle's church for many years.

The Bishop Tuttle memorial building will replace the old parish house which has proved inadequate for the large program of church and community work of

the cathedral. The memorial will not be limited to community and diocesan service. As the old parish house was used for various national conferences of the church, so will the new building, with its large auditorium, be offered to the National Council for conventions and conferences when desired.

The memorial will be connected with the first Episcopal church established west of the Mississippi river, and in a parish which is more than 100 years old, in the heart of St. Louis. It will also contain conference rooms, a large gymnasium, swimming pool, library and a radio station for broadcasting.

Bishop Tuttle, although a man of wide learning, and one upon whom many honors had been bestowed, was a man of great simplicity, beloved by all those with whom he was associated.

A fine response to a "big gift campaign" has come from the west especially from Montana and near by states, where, at the age of 93 Bishop Tuttle was consecrated in 1887 the first missionary bishop of the Episcopal church of Montana, and for 29 years was a strong and loved force of law and order in those rough days.

JAP EDUCATOR SEEKS ACCORD WITH AMERICA

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Friendship between America and Japan could be enhanced by the spreading in Japan of the information that the majority of American people are not prejudiced against the Japanese according to an opinion expressed here by Dr. Danjo Ebuna, president of the Doshisha University of Kyoto, Japan.

"If America, through her official and unofficial representatives in Japan, fails to broadcast this desirable information among the Japanese," Dr. Ebuna said, "then it is probable that my people, in view of recent events, will imagine that America is against them and will seek to unite the entire orient in a sentiment unfavorable to the occident. I regret the now difficulty that has arisen because of a possible misunderstanding between the American people and the Japanese."

Since Japan forsook the customs of the orient 70 years ago, the educator said, she has been following the ways of America as much as possible, politically, socially, economically, and even religiously, in spite of the fact that Japan's attitude toward western civilization was rewarded by the suspicion and hatred of China, Korea, and other oriental countries.

"When Japan turned her face toward the occident, I feel feeling sprang up between Japan and China," Dr. Ebuna asserted. "China considered Japan an imitator of the west, and Japan began to look upon China as a hopelessly reactionary nation. I am happy to say, however, that this ill feeling has largely disappeared and that China and Korea are adopting the ways of Japan."

"In their social life, as well as in other respects, I find that your American civilization has tended to elevate greatly the Japanese people and your criticism, as well as your sympathy, has contributed to their improvement."

Distress in West Ireland.

DUBLIN (AP)—At a conference in Clifden, County Galway, a state of acute distress in the West of Ireland was reported, and the government was urged to take steps to deal with the situation. The provision of poor relief in Mayo has put up the taxes 100 per cent within the last few months.

BANKER GIVES REAL VALUES

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Real dividends from a bank loan are not in the collection of principal and interest, but in the impetus which is given to productive achievement and the consequent gain in the aggregate of wealth and happiness.

Walter F. Head, president of the American Bankers' association, declared here today in an address before the Wisconsin Bankers' association.

"The banker's interest in his 'debtor-patron,' Mr. Head said, 'does not end with an examination of his statement and approval of the loan. It begins then. The interest in his debtor is not merely collection of the debt when due. It is to his interest that the borrower shall make his business successful in the largest possible way. He may collect his debt by selling his debtor's assets at auction, but if that is all he accomplishes he has failed.'

"The banker achieves success only when the money he loans enables an industry or a business to develop and grow, to become an increasing factor in the community, to contribute by its prosperity to the greater prosperity of those dependent upon it, and through them, to the greater prosperity of the entire territory in which it is located."

"To the bankers today, they also must be economists, sociologists, business men, versed in industry and in commerce, psychologists, knowing human nature, statesmen, understanding of politics, and they must have a knowledge of international affairs."

FLOATING FAIR TO TAKE GERMAN TRADE EASTWARD

HAMBURG, Germany (AP)—The first German floating fair will leave Hamburg July 30 on a voyage which will occupy ten months and take the fair ship "Industria" as far east as Yokohama.

The ship is to give testimony to post-war German enterprise, and is to carry the "Made in Germany" label to distant points of Europe, Asia and Africa. If the experiment proves successful a second ship is to be outfitted for a trip to North and South America.

There will be room for 570 exhibitors on this floating fair ground and in addition a printing shop, banking facilities, stenographic rooms, post and telegraph, film and magic lantern service and a news bureau. The film service is to show German places of interest, especially industrial towns and industrial processes.

It is planned that the floating fair shall stop from three to eight days in every harbor visited. The route is as follows: Helsingfors, Stockholm, Copenhagen, Southampton, Lisbon, Malaga, Barcelona, Palermo, Naples, Piraeus, Constantinople, Smyrna, Jaffa, Alexandria, Port Said, Aden, Karachi, Bombay, Colombo, Madras, Calcutta, Rangoon, Penang, Delhi, Singapore, Batavia, Soerabaya, Macassar, Bangkok, Manila, Canton, Shanghai, Tientsin, Kobe, Yokohama, Osaka and Yokohama.

HUNGRY JELLY FISH OUST THE HERRING KIND

BREMENHAVEN (AP)—European ichthyologists have become greatly exercised by the diminished numbers of haddock and herring in the North Sea from which England, Holland, Germany and various other countries obtain their principal fish supplies, and several conferences have been held by those interested in the fish industry to consider what steps may be taken to remedy the situation.

The herring began to disappear three years ago and the haddock some months later. Fish experts attribute the diminished numbers of both herring and the haddock to the appearance in the North Sea of incredibly large schools of jelly fish and various forms of sea nettle which were swept in from the Atlantic ocean in 1920, when several changes were reported in the different Atlantic currents.

The jelly fish came in a flood of warm water and made themselves at home at once, consuming the food of the herring in such great amount that the herring were unable to subsist. When they began to disappear the haddock too began gradually to diminish in numbers as it is upon the eggs of the herring that the haddock exists during a greater part of the year.

Law Will Be Enforced At Haines "Stampede"

HAINEs, Ore. (Special)—It is rumored that a force of federal and state prohibition officers will make Haines their headquarters during the Stampede, which is to be held here the last three days of this week.

It is generally understood that prohibition measures are to be enforced here during the entire week and bootleggers and drunks will be rounded up and removed from the streets and grounds as rapidly as they appear.

There has never been serious disorder at Haines during the annual outdoor show held here and the officials and Stampede management do not intend that any lawlessness shall interfere with the exhibition this year.

BERLIN (AP)—War literature has been thrown into discard as far as demand for it on the part of the Berlin reading public is concerned. Novels with exciting plots, especially if they are dramatized on the screen, are the top-notchers in demand, according to Berlin librarians. So it is that books on travel are most in demand.

publican party with attempts at palliation of the offenses of the "unfaithful public servants." Senator Walsh declared that it "is in this easy tolerance of turpitude in public office that the real peril of free government lies rather than in its casual occurrence."

"The president of the United States himself," he continued, "has not hesitated to endeavor to shield the delinquents from the public odium to which their derelictions have subjected them by joining in the hush and cry against the investigations that have been conducted under the authority of the senate and against that body for authorizing them. His message on the subject had for its plain purpose the suppression of an inquiry into the official conduct of a member of his cabinet."

Senator Walsh said President Coolidge had historic warrant for his attitude, recalling that when the British house of commons sought to investigate the Duke of Buckingham, Charles would not permit it.

"Charles lost his head," the senator added, "and Calvin Coolidge

Friends of "Buffalo Bill" Asked to Sign

CODY, Wyo. (AP)—A compilation of incidents and anecdotes relating to the life of Colonel William F. (Buffalo Bill) Cody, for whom this town was named, is to be undertaken in connection with the unveiling of a statue to the famous Indian fighter on July 4 here. The work is to be done under the direction of Mayor R. C. Trueblood.

The plans include the collection of signatures of Buffalo Bill's friends into a huge tome to be known as "the register of Colonel Cody's friends." Additional volumes will contain incidents of his life. The register of friends is expected to contain the names of all high officials of the United States government, as well as those of several ruling monarchs of Europe, with several of whom Colonel Cody was intimately associated. Mayor Trueblood expresses the belief that Colonel Cody had more friends than any man living in his time. The mayor has issued an appeal to all acquaintances of the famous frontiersman to send in data for the memorial library.

The statue will show Colonel Cody astride a rampant horse. It will be reared near the entrance to the city. The Cody archives are expected to furnish to posterity intimate glimpses of life in the early west.

Forsees National Calamity
Declaring the republican party to be important in the face of "an impending national calamity," Senator Walsh said that because of antagonism within its ranks it had ceased to be an organization through which the business of the country can be carried on.

"It has no remedy, it offers no relief from the paralysis that afflicts agriculture, threatening every form of industry," the chairman said. "Moreover it finds itself plighted with representatives in both houses of congress, holding views so radically antagonistic to those of the dominant faction in the party as to preclude the possibility of uniting on any program of legislation."

"Efforts of the dominant faction to shake off the insurgent members is as ludicrous as it will prove futile," the speaker continued, adding that "they could not be shaken off because they have the endorsement of their people."

Senator Walsh said he knew how eager the managers of the campaign for the re-election of President Coolidge "were to switch the issues from honest government, the repeal of the new tariff abominations, relief for agriculture and related reforms, to the league of nations." He added that it was not so necessary that America immediately join the league as that it would alone foolish antagonism to any world movement merely because it was in some way associated with the league.

"The honor of our country," he declared, "the prosperity of our people, demands that we return to the ideals of Woodrow Wilson, that we resume the place he won for us—the moral leadership of the world."

"He is deeply grounded in American principles, the constitution and the law. He opposes any discrimination on account of religious belief. It is repugnant to his sterling Americanism."

"McAdoo stands for the supremacy of the law and for the enforcement of the law—the solemn duty of the executive."

Johnson Nominates Underwood
NEW YORK (By the Associated Press)—The demand of Senator Oscar W. Underwood of Alabama that the democratic national con-

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vention condemn by name the political activities of the Ku Klux Klan was voted to the convention by Forney Johnston, of Alabama, as the keynote of his speech placing Mr. Underwood's name before the convention for the presidential nomination.

"No bare reference to the constitution or the bill of rights, actually mentioned in the Klan oath, is adequate in this connection," Mr. Johnston declared. "The bill of rights are limitations only upon the state and federal governments and not upon private citizens. That is why the candidate of my people has insinuating and placing words."

"Above all does the candidate we represent condemn the massed action of secret political orders in furtherance of any objective which is plainly contrary to the spirit of the constitution."

Senator Underwood, Mr. Johnston said, had no word to say against those who joined any order, secret or otherwise, organized for lawful purposes or to advocate openly any principle within the scope of legitimate public discussion.

"What he does condemn is the participation in politics by any secret organization whatsoever," the speaker continued. "He believes that such action intimidates public officials and encourages political or oath-bound pledges contrary to public policy."
