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WILL EXPLOIT NEW TRIUMPHS

Advance in Agriculture
to Be Shown at Field
Day of College Experimental Station.

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)—Advances made in all phases of agriculture, including a new method of growing wheat, will be shown at the annual field day of the Washington State College experimental station here July 1.

Special interest is expected to center about the advance plot of wheat, the new method of growing which this year is being tested in small plots by 150 farmers of the state. Markham says a new variety, also will be displayed. In the cereal department another feature will be ten acres of land divided into 34 plots, showing the results of 22 crop rotations. Results of the proper use of insecticides in a rotation system and their effect on succeeding crops will be demonstrated on 110 field plots of the same department. The proper place for peas in a rotation system will be illustrated by field demonstrations. The life of an alfalfa field and the length of time before it should be plowed under and replanted to wheat or some other crop will be illustrated in detail. Experiments to ascertain the best methods to be employed to prevent soil washing also will be conducted.

Japanese Industries Recover From Earthquake Paralysis

TOKYO, (AP)—The rapid recovery of industries in the Tokyo area which suffered from the earthquake and fire of September 1, is indicated in employment figures published by the government. The best barometer of recovery is the absorption of unemployed labor.

The figures show that nearly 4,500 workers in Tokyo were taken back by the factories in March while the April figure is expected to approach 7,000. Printing houses and candy factories have had the greatest revival and are working near on a production scale higher than that before the earthquake and employing more labor. The metal work industries, which languished for months after the disaster, are approaching normal conditions again.
