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power in this high office as well as his senatorial vote, he was able to and he did perform his full measure of patriotic duty.

"Then too by reason of his long term of membership on the democratic national committee, where his services always proved of great value in the party councils and political campaigns, our candidate is endowed with a peculiar and broad knowledge of party affairs which would be of inestimable benefit if he were nominated for the high office of president."

In the position he has demonstrated his ability, honesty and courage. He is capable of carrying his message to the people of the entire nation as he did to the people of his own state. He is not only a favorite son, but a native son of the great Sunflower state of Kansas."

"My fellow delegates, you are asked to select your standard-bearer from the busy, bustling commercial center of the east. Again you are asked to make such selection from the golden west and again from the sunny south. I ask you to come where the west begins."

Samuel Ralston Nominated.
NEW YORK, (AP)—In an address of 239 words, twenty-seven words shorter than Lincoln's Gettysburg address, Fred Van Nuys of Indianapolis, today placed Samuel M. Ralston in nomination for the presidency. Van Nuys emphasized Ralston's ability as a vote-getter and his record for economy while governor of Indiana particularly.

"As governor of Indiana he made an unparalleled record for economy and efficiency. He left over \$5,000,000 in the state treasury, and the state out of debt for the first time in eighty-two years."

"As United States senator he has shown himself possessed of rare poise and purpose," said Van Nuys. "and he has been president of the United States senate during the past month just passed he would not have remained so calm and silent. He would not have broadcasted stances to an outraged and expectant people. He would have led them with a dynamic and not a static spirit of Americanism. We need him at the head of the nation's affairs today."

He is a rugged American of the midwest. Intensely honest and of unswerving fearlessness."

"On behalf of the nation which hangs expectantly upon the results of this convention, we present the name of Samuel Ralston of Indiana for the presidency."

Davis Is Nominated.
NEW YORK, (AP)—Jonathan M. Davis, governor of Kansas, was placed in nomination for president at the democratic national convention today as "a fair representative in its truest sense of the progressive west," and as a "forcible executive who would inspire the confidence of congress in his leadership."

Representative William A. Ayres, of Wichita, spoke for Kansas in formally placing her governor before the convention, and he answered that the choice of the Sunflower State had demonstrated that he could carry his message to the nation as he had so successfully carried it to the people of his own state.

"People everywhere, but more

especially in the midwest and the great northwest, in the agricultural sections," Mr. Ayres said, "are looking for, and demanding something more tangible than putting attention to the acts and noble deeds of the past. They are expecting something more than a platform of pledges. Performance can be accomplished only by a forcible executive who can inspire confidence in the legislative branch, who can impress the congress that he possesses the qualities of leadership and statesmanship, and who is not unmindful of the fact that he should be the supreme leader and champion of all the people and not of a favored few."

"There is no use for place in this nation for two reactionary political parties. One is enough. The platform of the conservative or reactionary party has been made and the nominees announced."

"It will be remembered the agricultural was requested during the year by the chief executive to donate and redouble his efforts to supply the necessary foodstuffs. This he did ungrudgingly and patriotically, which accounts in a large measure for his disability at this time. He was not given a 10 per cent plus contract, and he was not guaranteed by his government 3.75 to 6 per cent return on his investment. He was not financed by the government in his enterprise of furnishing food and by reason thereof he is at this time suffering a disability. Therefore, no doubt, he was thrilled when he saw that wonderful constructive plank of the republican platform which pledges a continuing and increasing substitute for all suffering any disability as a result of service to this nation in time of war."

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opposition and his recitation of Smith's record. Again and again they were bursts of cheering as Roosevelt described Smith's rise from a poverty stricken home on the East Side to the governor's mansion."

When Roosevelt finished the convention was plunged into a roaring demonstration, aided and abetted by complete organization of demonstrators, hundreds of whom marched into the hall from beneath the platform and from outside. Bands, rosters armed with megaphones, cheer leaders, singers and others, with all equipment of the professional demonstrator, kept up the racket. From the speakers stand it appeared that probably half of the delegate space was taken part in the demonstration either by marching or by standing on chairs and waving flags and joining in the cheering.

However, the galleries, professional demonstrators and rosters who had been tucked in up under the rafters and into every nook and cranny on the floor, made the bulk of the noise and at times actually drowned out the band."

After the Smith demonstration reached the hour and one-quarter mark Roosevelt signaled to the Smith floor managers to halt the racket. Had to Call Police. After the Smith demonstration had passed the hour mark it was apparent that the duration of the noise-making and parading was only a question of how long Smith managers might decide to let it continue before closing down the streets, cutting off the bands and passing the word to the rosters to the front. When the demonstration finally stopped the aides were so elated that sergeant-at-arms were powerless and the police were called to clear the rosters. While the Smith demonstration was at its height, confetti dropped from adjacent skyscrapers and fell through the open roof, fluttering into the convention hall like snow.

Senator Joseph T. Robinson, of Arkansas, was formally placed before the democratic convention Wednesday for nomination for president.
