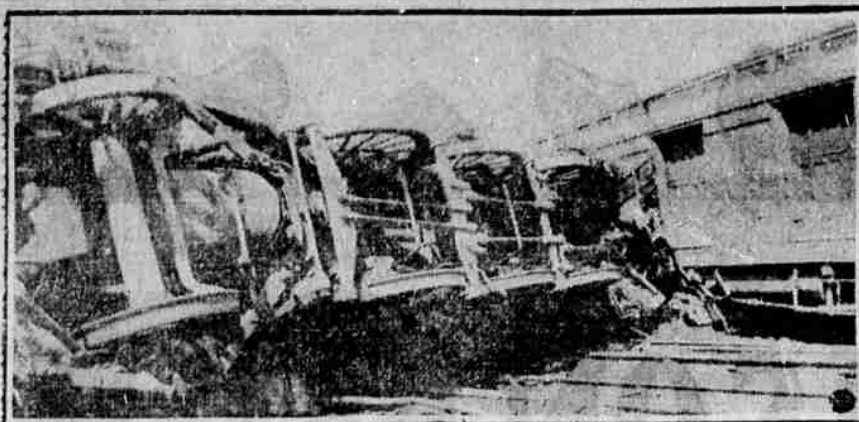
Mr. Henry Connell and his daughter Barbara Ruth have been at Wallawa the past week visiting relatives.

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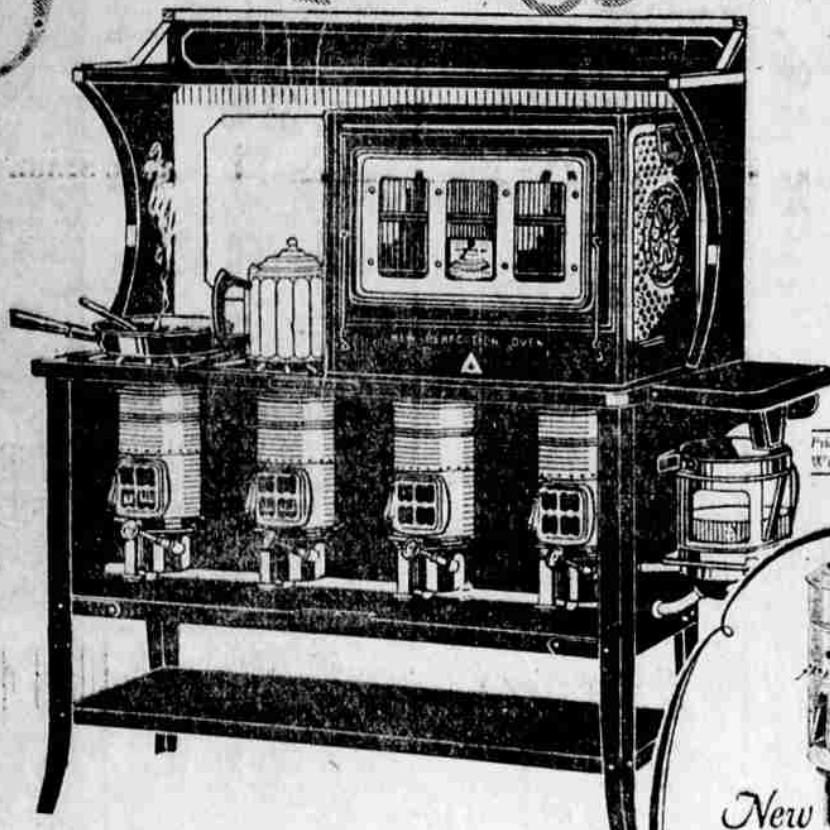
