turned to their rivalries over McAdoo and Smith, with more demonstrations and counter demonstrations as speakers from a dozen states proceeded with a long list of seconding speeches.

While Baker was speaking he referred to the league of nations and league men on the floor started a demonstration, in which probably a third or fourth of the delegates rose to their feet, cheering.

In the afternoon the convention rose, cheering, and several western delegates started a parade when Governor Charles W. Bryan, of Nebraska, was placed in nomination. Shouts of "Hurrah for Bryan," occurred and the band played tunes of old time days when William Jennings Bryan, now a delegate from Florida, was the party's undisputed leader. The demonstration, like that for Cox, was manifestly another tribute to a name revered in party history, rather than a manifestation of support for the man placed in nomination today. The tribute to the name of Bryan wound up with the delegates singing "Onward Christian Soldiers."

Others Nominated.

When order was restored Francis Clyde Keefe, of Dover, New Hampshire, nominated Governor Fred H. Brown, John A. Matthews then nominated Governor Sizer, of New Jersey and Senator Swanson nominated Carter Glass, of Virginia.

Smart Knitted Togs In Sportswear Revue

NEW YORK. (Special) — The Sportswear Revue, presented under the auspices of the Knitted Outerwear Bureau, in connection with the recent National Outdoor Sports Exposition at the Grand Central Palace, revealed to everyone the indisputable importance of knitted outerwear in the world of sports.

Every type of knitted attire was displayed on masculine and feminine models, including garments for both summer and winter sports. And, what is most important, all the numbers shown were distinctly wearable—knitted to withstand the strain of the sports for which they were intended.

Outfits for riding, skating, hockey, baseball, hiking and hunting were shown in jersey, camel's hair and heavy jumbo knitted costumes. In several instances sweaters, knickers, hose, scarf and tam were knitted to match.

Knitted apparel for the less strenuous sports, as well as given much attention. The fisher maid, in a close-fitting orange sports sweater, tweed knickers, heavy boots and wide-brimmed hat drew many favorable comments.

An equally interesting outfit worn by the huntress, consisted of heavy leather boots, tweed knickers, hunting blouse and jaunty wide-brimmed hat—all in buff. The clever jacket was knitted to simulate the leather blouse, with snap hip band and cuffs, and capacious bellows pockets. Both masculine and feminine spectators expressed enthusiastic approval of this practical costume which bids fair to rival the leather jacket that has hitherto held the field to itself, and at a fraction of the latter's cost.

Of course, the ensemble costume for wear at the country club was in evidence in soft mohair, bouclé and fibre-silk one-piece frocks boasting either a smart matching jacket or a jaunty shoulder cape.

The many women who have elected to carry out a costume scheme in black and white will be interested in one of these striking affairs, which boasted a three-quarter length cape with a Peter Pan collar. Its one-piece frock was a tubular model, in white, with an all-over diamond jacquard design. Inch-wide stripes in solid black banded the wide sleeves and lower

portion of the trim frock, and striped the entire surface of the cape.

Correct clothes for golf and tennis were stressed, including sweater sleeveless jackets, slipovers and one and two-piece knitted frocks, charming golf costume was achieved by the combination of a clever sleeveless jacquard in Mexico with bouclé trimmings in tangerine, and a tangerine pleated skirt.

Nearly every sweater and frock repeated its color harmonies in

an accompanying graceful knitted scarf.

Yellow was a feature unto itself—finding expression in numberless costumes. In a simple one-piece frock knitted of white mohair, yellow fibre silk was used to construct a wide plaid—a combination at once effective and successful.

New are the "convict" striped bathing suits for men and women now making their appearance at the summer watering places. In the Sportswear Revue these were interpreted in varied hues, generally alternating strong colors such as bright blue, red, or green with stripes of white. Many of the bathing suits were worn with heavy shaker sweaters in white or solid colors, a decided preference being given the sweater over the beach cape.
