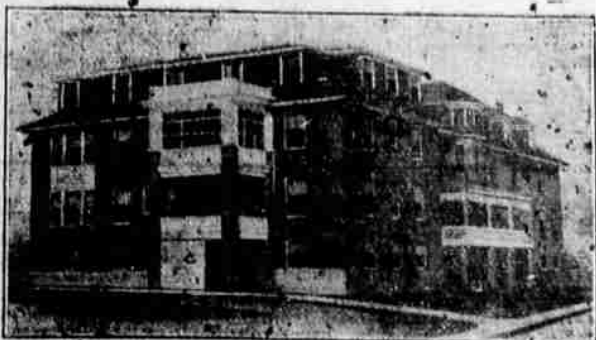
### Notice of Hearing on Proposed Street Improvement.

## UMATILLA COUNTY FISH AND GAME BODY IS FORMED

PENDLETON, Ore. (Special)—The Umatilla County Fish & Game Protective association in the name of a county wide organization of sportsmen that was formed here Thursday night when representatives from a majority of the communities attended a meeting.

H. E. Hill of Hermiston was elected president of the board of directors. Charles Braucher of Pilot Rock was named vice-president and E. H. Moss of Hills was named secretary-treasurer.

The conservation and protection of fish and game in Umatilla county, the adoption of a unified program that will represent and give a fair deal to all parts of the county in the matter of stocking streams with fish and fields with birds and other matters of common interest to sportsmen are the chief aims of the organization.

Agents Make New York Dry. NEW YORK, (AP)—Wayne H. Wheeler, general counsel for the Anti-Saloon league, declared Friday federal prohibition agents have seized 200,000 cases of liquor 200 barrels of beer and 2500 gallons of beverage alcohol in New York since the Democratic convention crowd began to arrive last Saturday.

Congressman Little Dies. WASHINGTON, (AP)—Representative Edward C. Little of Kansas died in a hospital here Friday.

Death was caused by a slight stroke of paralysis. Representative Little, a Republican, was serving his fourth term in the house from the Second Kansas district. He was known as an author, and had served in the diplomatic corps as consul general in Egypt. As a lieutenant colonel of the Kansas national guard, he took part in several engagements in the Philippines.

Salt Lake May Lose Const League Team. SALT LAKE, (AP)—President H. W. Lane of the Salt Lake club of the Pacific coast league admitted Friday that it was exceedingly doubtful that the team would return to Salt Lake after the conclusion of the present series with Los Angeles.

Mr. Lane, however, does not state positively that a change of franchise will be made at this time. He said he would be unable to make any decision until he confers with officials of the other clubs of the league.

Accommodated at Salt Lake resulting in a deficit for the team and for the visiting clubs, is the cause of the threatened abandonment of the club according to President Lane.

## PRISONERS ARE MADE TO SING FOR SCIENTIST

BERLIN, (AP)—One of the most interesting by-products of the world war has been the founding in Berlin of an "anthropometric" library as a part of the Prussian state library. It is an aggregation of human sounds recorded upon phonograph plates and was founded by Professor Wilhelm Dugem.

Struck by the idea that the presence of prisoners of war from every quarter of the globe in German internment camps afforded an unique opportunity for assembling a collection of sounds and songs and pronunciations of words he undertook the task.

Professor Dugem spent months in visiting the various camps as head of a commission of scientists and asked the prisoners to sing folk songs and pronounce words and other various characteristic sounds. The collection was intended to include the characteristic made on native instruments of various countries.

The collection of sounds now numbers some 2,000, and includes those from those nations of the earth, as Professor Dugem's researches were greatly extended after the war. Of such reproduction these original plates are made with an estimated life of 2,000 to 3,000 years. These are carefully stored in the vaults of the library, while ordinary hard-wood plates are used for the demonstration.

More lately the collection has been extended to include noises in nature, such as the rustling of leaves, the whistling of the wind, the roar of the ocean and the roll of thunder.

30 Miners Asphyxiated. VIRGINIA, (AP)—Thirty miners were asphyxiated Friday by an explosion in the cellophane at Hartington. Rescue work was impossible owing to the defective gas masks and some of the miners perished in their sleep.
