Just as the old story of the native New Yorker's geographical horizon ending with the Hudson river was ever, everything went of that being wilderness, so is the political vision of New Yorkers at the convention limited to Al Smith. He is the beginning and the end of their hopes, the only thing they will consider even for a moment.
