ISLAND TROOPS
MAY GET CHOICE
U. S. ARMY POSTS

MANILA (AP).—Military au-
thorities in the Philippines de-
partment have recently discussed
tentative plans for the gradual
concentration of the United States
forces in the islands at Fort Ne-
rion and Corregidor Island. At
present the United States troops

are stationed at seven widely
separated points, and the plans
under discussion included the
abandonment of five of these
posts, including Fort San Juan,
Manila, Camp Stotsenberg, 11
miles north of Manila, Piti Par-
uel, Zamboanga, and Camp
John Hay at Laguio.

MILITARY IS
BIG BENEFIT
VS. SCIENCE

HILA, Island of Hawaii (AP).—
Science and superstition vi-
sited each other in explaining the
present unusual activity at the
Halemauau fire of the Kil-
auea volcano.

Science, in the person of Roy
Finch, temporarily in charge of
the volcano observatory at Kil-
auea, advances the theory that
tons of rock, avalanched down
from the sides of the crater have
checked the vent through which
Mather Nature mainly eases the
pressure on the earth by pouring
forth surplus lava into the great
pit, raising the lava lake in the
crater and withdrawing the fiery
substance from the crater when
the pressure has been more than
relieved. The lava underneath
the surface, unable to find its
way into the open, generates gas
which blasts its path out of the
vent, carrying with it tons of rock
and dust. The explosions and
earthquakes shake down further
avalanches from the crater sides
which again may block the vent,
in an unending circle, according
to the theory.

In December, 1924, the tale
runs, the Princess Kapiolani, con-

and cried to Pele: "Jehovah is
my God. I defy thee, Pele."

As wallans stood in awe while
she spoke, Pele, they said, would
suddenly rise in her wrath make
the earth tremble and cast forth
the seething lava of her lava, as
she did in 1790 when the army
of the high chief Keoua was an-
nihilated. But nothing happened.

statement after announcing that college, and from college to gradu-
Mr. Rockefeller had discontinued his gifts, that the university has no
right of further approach to the
founders as individuals, "and less
reason to make such an approach
to Mr. Rockefeller." To the uni-
versity's resources of approximately
\$54,000,000, President Burton
said, "there should be added within
the next ten or 15 years at least an
equal amount," and for this sum
"we must look largely to Chicago."

"When in December, 1910, Mr.
Rockefeller promised to give the
university the sum of \$10,000,000
in ten annual payments, he accom-
panied this pledge with a statement
that this was his final gift, and
commended the university to the
friendly citizens of Chicago as
those to whom it should look for
the means with which to insure its
future development," President
Burton asserted. "In pursuance of
this statement and policy Mr. Rock-
efeller discontinued his gifts."
"It is but reasonable that Mr.
Rockefeller should feel that the city
whose name it bears and whose
citizens have already shown their
interest in it by many generous
gifts, should adopt the university
as their own. The cost of educa-
tion rises with startling rapidity as
one passes upward from school to

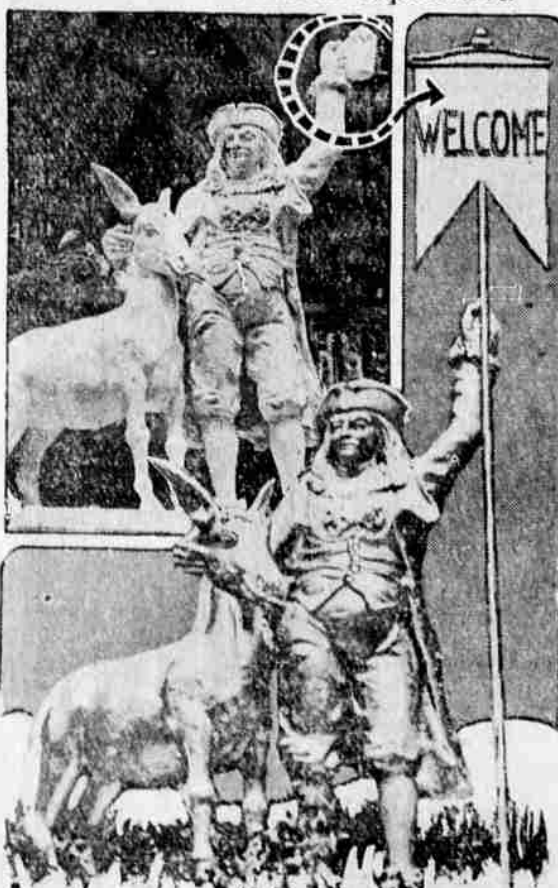
