WASHINGTON (NEA Special)—Not the least of the considerations guiding the Democrats as they grope for new combinations from which to evolve a presidential ticket is the matter of campaign slogans. For, after all, a catch phrase may be a more powerful factor in building up popular support than mere matters of a candidate's political or economic viewpoint.

With "Keep Cool and Keep Coolidge" as the high point in Republican sloganeering to date, the Democrats are seeking a candidate on whom can be hung a phrase still more stimulating. McAdoo boosters believe the most effective campaigning could be done through buttons and banners picturing the Democratic rooster, with arched neck and flapping wings emitting a new challenge.

Instead of crowing "cock-a-doodle do!" according to standard barnyard formula, this rooster would raise the roof with "McAdoo'll do! McAdoo'll do!"

As an immediate counter-irritant to the "Keep Cool and Coolidge" cry, pending final selection of a candidate, a new version has been started at national committee headquarters asking that the country "Keep Cool without Coolidge."

This, however, it is realized, is only a stop-gap. It merely harmonizes with the slogan situation. It is plainly defensive, not offensive, as a truly good slogan should be.

"At's our pal. He'll beat Cal." is the suggestion from Franklin Roosevelt and Norman Mack of the Smith outfit.

"Cacety, but lacking punch," is the comment of one of the fence delegates to this Smith phrase.

Davis and Davis; they can save us! is the proposal of certain dark horse boosters who are combining in one cry the names of a combination ticket that has caught considerable favor.

"John and Johnathan," is a second cry that could be evolved from this ticket, which, as may be seen, possesses undoubted elasticity.

NEW YORK (AP)—The Democratic platform's plank on law enforcement and rights of the states were greeted with enthusiastic approval Sunday by two organizations, normally as divergent as the police. The Anti-Saloon league and the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment.

Wayne B. Wheeler, general counsel of the Anti-Saloon league, joyfully declared "both parties have accepted the veto." W. H. Stanton, national vice president of the Association against Prohibition, announced, said: "We are satisfied with the law enforcement and states rights plank as they express our principles as accurately as we could have stated them ourselves."

Four Criminal Indictments Returned by the Federal Grand Jury in Washington.

WASHINGTON (By the Associated Press)—Criminal indictments were returned by the federal grand jury today against Albert B. Fall, former secretary of the interior, Harry F. Sinclair, E. L. Doheny, Sr., oil operators and E. L. Doheny Jr., as the outgrowth of the leasing of naval oil reserves. Four indictments were returned. The first named Fall, Doheny and Doheny Jr., charging them with a conspiracy to defraud the government in connection with the leasing of the California reserves. In the second Fall and Sinclair were accused of conspiring to defraud in connection with the Teapot Dome lease.

Bribery Charged
The third charged Fall with accepting \$100,000 for using his official influence in the California leases in behalf of Doheny Sr.

The two Dohenys, in the fourth indictment, were charged with inducing Fall by unlawful payment of \$100,000 to take unlawful action.

COLLEGE HEAD
WRECK VICTIM

CHICAGO, Ill. (By the Associated Press)—F. W. McNair, president of the Michigan College of Mines and three women passengers and a fireman were killed when a fast fall train from Omaha ran into the rear end of the Denver train No. 2, of the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy near Budd, Illinois, early today.

Dr. McNair, the three women, and W. J. Brechtel, of Aurora, Ill., fireman on Train No. 6 were killed outright and J. A. Tripietti, porter of Train No. 2, died in the hospital at Princeton, Ill.

The block system was used and apparently the engineer of the mail train failed to observe the signal, according to a statement from the office of the general manager of the road.

Fireman Brechtel of the mail train, jumped but was caught between the locomotive and tender and was crushed to death. The engineer stayed in the cab and was uninjured.

Close Vote in Democratic Convention Ends Turmoil and Strife

UNOFFICIAL VOTE
WAS 546.15 TO 541.85Plank Advocating the
League of Nations Favored
by Woodrow Wilson Rejected.

NEW YORK (By the Associated Press)—The official recapitulation of the Democratic convention vote before adjournment early Sunday on the Ku Klux Klan plank showed that the minority plank, in which the Klan was mentioned was defeated by four votes and a fraction, the total being 546.16 against the minority plank and 541.85 for it.

Although most of the delegates listed under the McAdoo banner voted against denouncing the Klan and those known to favor Smith supported the specific declaration, managers of both candidates declared no instructions had been

Delegates Devote Day

NEW YORK (AP)—Worn by five days of convention sessions and nerves on edge from the bedlam of noise within the convention hall, hundreds of delegates to the Democratic convention Sunday welcomed a "day off" and took advantage of entertainment features arranged by the New York committee.

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Loss in Life Ninety-Four in Ohio, Check Today Reveals.

CITY OF LORAIN,
OHIO, WRECKEDProperty Loss Placed at
Thirty Million Dollars;
Relief Work Is Underway.

CLEVELAND, O. (By the Associated Press)—Ninety-four persons are known dead in Ohio as the result of the storm Saturday. The dead at Lorain are seventy. Although the loss of life is not as great as at first reported the property loss is estimated at \$30,000,000.

CLEVELAND, Ohio (By the Associated Press)—Loss of life in Saturday's tornado which wrecked a large portion of Lorain and parts of Sandusky and other Ohio cities was not as great as first reported, but re-checking of casualties Sunday night showed that probably 100 persons lost their lives in this storm and almost simultaneously disturbances at Pittsburgh and in the upper Mississippi valley.

The greatest loss of life was at Lorain, where the latest count showed 52 dead and 114 injured, a score of them suffering severe burns. The property loss there was upwards of thirty million dollars, 124 city blocks having been demolished. At Sandusky it was found that only six persons were killed, although 100 were injured and property valued at two million dollars was destroyed.

There were seven fatalities in Cleveland, although the property damage was small. Pittsburgh reported five persons killed, while Canton, Ohio, reported three dead and Akron one. The death toll in Iowa and Illinois was 12, making a death toll of 93. The total property damage when reports from the rural regions are complete, will probably aggregate fifty million dollars.

Despite the devastation at Lorain, where the tornado tore down a quarter of the city, organized rescue work went forward smoothly and state troops kept order among the inhabitants, hundreds of whom were thrown out of their homes and had to be sheltered in tents and with friends.
