Peons Driven Over Border
By Mexican Land Allotments

MEXICO CITY, (AP)—Paradoxical as it may seem, the first effect of the national agrarian program, intended to provide a bit of land for each of Mexico's long downtrodden peons, is to swell the tide of emigrants to the United States, according to Cesar Cordoba, general secretary of the National Agrarian commission.

This emigration, says Mr. Cordoba, results from the fact that wealthy land-owners, when they learn that their peons have petitioned the national government for land, conspire with venal authorities to institute a veritable reign of terror against the petitioners. Without money or work the peons are unable to remain until the red tape involving a division of lands is unwound, and are forced to migrate.

Mr. Cordoba maintains, however, that data in the files of the commission shows that the real cause of Mexican emigration is lack of land and that there is virtually no emigration from sections where the good effects of the agrarian laws have been felt.

Iron Ore Resources of World

Menaced by Rust and Corrosion
CHICAGO (AP)—Battling rust and corrosion costs approximately two and a half billion dollars a year, according to W. J. Overbeck, superintendent of the DuPont company of Chicago.

"This sum spent annually to counteract the ravages of corrosion and rust will give a fair idea of the total bill the world is paying for the slow decay of metals used in industrial work which are not protected against them," he declared. "It is a vital matter because the yearly waste is making the iron ore resources of the world exhaustible within a measurable distance of time."

NEW YORK (By the Associated Press)—The Democratic convention by unofficial vote of 547 to 546 declared itself against a platform plank naming the Ku Klux Klan in connection with its declaration against tolerance.

The platform was perfected at 2 o'clock Sunday morning, when, amid scenes of confusion seldom paralleled in the party history, a plank condemning the Klan by name was pronounced rejected by a narrow margin.

The convention also rejected a plank advocating the league of nations as favored by Woodrow Wilson. This question was decided previously to the Klan question by adoption of a plank reaffirming in general terms only the party's faith in the league of nations.

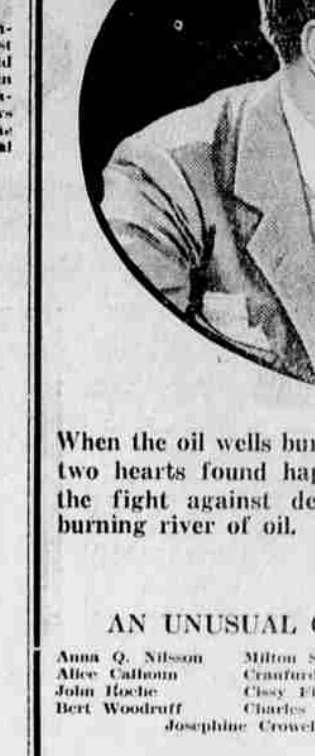
