German Trade Unions Thank British Colleagues for Help

LONDON, (AP)—The British Trades Union congress has earned the gratitude of the German Federation of Trades Unions for their moral and other help in strengthening the German workers against their employers.

A letter from Herr Leipart, secretary of the German Federation, to their English fellow-workers congratulates "the hearty thanks of German Trade unionism to the English Trade unions for their willing and self-sacrificing help, without which we certainly should not have been able, as we now are, energetically to oppose the employers in their attempts to lower the conditions of labor."

Everywhere in Germany, Herr Leipart continued, the struggle for increased wages has been initiated despite the attack on the eight-hour day by the employers. The majority of German workers still have an eight-hour day, and he is confident they will be able to reestablish it where it has been lost if an understanding with France on the basis of the experts' report is reached.

Brides Like Air Flights To Start Married Life

LONDON, (AP)—Honeymoon trips to the continent by air seem to be a fashion which is rapidly growing, and the swift and exhilarating flight across the channel has now become recognized as an ideal way of starting married life.

In nearly every case these trips seem to have been the thought of the bride, and it has been noticed that she is invariably the least nervous of the two when waiting for the airplane at the Croydon air station.

Most of the mills are preparing to close down having exhausted their log supplies. This means that very little lumber will be added to present stocks. Northern manufacturers see a good market ahead and state that a shortage of hardwood lumber next fall and winter, followed by higher prices, would not be a surprising development.

No Cash for Workmen, German Shoemakers Pay With Stock

PIRMASENS, Germany, (AP)—When payday came around in this shoe manufacturing town recently, the factory owners were up against it for cash. The scarcity of liquid capital is quite as acute in the shoe industry as it is in any branch of German trade.

A novel way was sought out of the dilemma. Instead of paying the men off in marks, they gave them each a pair of shoes as part payment of their wages.

An hour later virtually the whole shoe working population had been transformed into a sales aggregation. From store to store wanderer heads of families, trying to dispose of their pair of shoes in return for things to eat.

RETAIL GAIN IS PERMANENT

The gain in bookings reported by lumber manufacturers during the first week of June was not temporary, as later statistics show. The gain was held during the second week of this month, when orders accepted by mills reporting to seven manufacturers' associations in all parts of the country amounted to 83 per cent of the production for the same week. Bookings of southern pine and Douglas fir business totaled 94 per cent of output. Western pines, however, did not register a gain.

The lumber market is considerably firmer than a fortnight ago, says the American Lumberman, Chicago. The reason is not so much increase in demand as steady curtailment of production practiced in all producing territories, but particularly on the west coast. Stocks of the principal softwoods are nowhere heavy, and manufacturers say that only a moderate further increase in demand would result in a scarcity of some of the more popular items. They believe that better business is approaching and are disinclined, in view of the high manufacturing costs, to book orders on the present low market.

The hardwood market shows no great change. Southern producers report a good deal of export inquiry and a fair volume of orders, with a growing scarcity of white oak and plain red gum, the woods mostly wanted by overseas buyers. Flooring, mahogany and door and interior trim manufacturers continue to be the leading factors. Furniture interests are opening their midsummer shows and a fair business from that source is expected to follow these. Agricultural implement makers are busy putting out new models, and automobile plants continue to operate on reduced schedules and to buy hesitatingly. However, they have little lumber on hand and must soon come into the market on a larger scale if they expect to keep running at all.

Notice is hereby given to all whom it may concern that the Commission of the City of La Grande, Union County, Oregon, proposes and intends to improve improvement District No. 144 in the City of La Grande, Oregon, in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor heretofore adopted by the Commission, and that the report of the committee on estimates for said improvement is now on file in the office of the Recorder of the City of La Grande, Oregon; that the said Commission has set Wednesday, the 23rd day of July, 1924, at 7:30 o'clock p. m. of said day, at the Commission Room in the City Building in La Grande, Oregon, as the time and place when and where said Commission will meet and hear and determine all objections, remonstrances and claims of grievance of any persons against said proposed improvement, and the proposed assessment therefor, against the property to be benefited thereby in said district.

That the boundaries of the district to be improved and benefited by the said proposed improvement are as follows, to-wit: Beginning at the center of the intersection of "N" Avenue and Oak Street in the City of La Grande, Union County, Oregon; thence north along the center line of Oak Street one hundred sixty (160) feet; thence east along a line one hundred sixty (160) feet from and parallel to the center line of "N" Avenue a distance of four hundred fifty (450) feet; thence north along a line one hundred fifty (150) feet from and parallel to the center line of First Street to the center line of "O" Avenue; thence east along the center line of "O" Avenue three hundred ten (310) feet; thence south along a line one hundred sixty (160) feet from and parallel to the center line of First Street a distance of four hundred eighty (480) feet; thence west along a line one hundred sixty (160) feet from and parallel to the center line of "N" Avenue to the center line of "N" Avenue.
