URGE SAFETY FOR CHILDREN

Safeguard Kiddies on the Fourth of July Is Plea of Committee.

NEW YORK (AP).—Don't celebrate Independence Day by sacrificing forever your eyesight or that of someone else.

This is the warning issued here today by the national committee for the prevention of blindness. Although great progress has been made in the movement for safe and sane celebrations of independence day, the committee says the Fourth of July is followed each year by a flood of reports of accidents to little boys and girls which, in many cases, blind them and in most others so seriously impair their vision that they are handicapped for life.

Injuries to the eyes from the use of fireworks and firearms are not, however, confined to Independence Day celebrations. The committee has within recent months received reports of serious injuries to the eyes of 224 children through the use of fireworks and firearms since the Fourth of July of last year. In 79 of these cases the child had been shot in the eye with an air rifle; the eyes of 70 children were seriously injured by other firearms; in 41 cases the eyes of a child were seriously injured by the explosion of so-called "dynamite caps," commonly used as ammunition for "dynamite canes," the eyes of 21 children were injured by premature blasts of explosives, and 13 by display fireworks.

The committee found that while eye accidents of this type are recurring throughout the year, there is a sharp and sudden rise in their frequency during the first week of July and immediately following Christmas, due to the use of fireworks in Christmas celebrations, particularly in the south, and to the popularity of the air rifle as a Christmas gift for boys.

The committee believes that fireworks have a proper and desirable place in the life of the American boy; that the focus attention on historical events in a way beyond the power of ordinary history instruction; and that they do stimulate patriotism. But the committee feels that the eyesight of several hundred children each year is too high a price to pay for the good that is accomplished by the free use of fireworks and firearms, particularly during the Fourth of July and the days immediately preceding it. The committee urges every parent and other adult responsible for the care of children to take steps immediately to avert this year a repetition of the "catastrophic" Fourth of July accidents. Specifically, the committee recommends that firearms of all sorts be put out of reach of children; that all fireworks be kept out of the hands of little children and that the use of so-called dynamite caps, giant cannon crackers, skyrockets, roman candles and other powerful fireworks be restricted to grown children under the supervision of adults.

Four-Day Celebration. Dallas, Ore.—Dallas will have a four-day celebration next week. Wednesday an old-time loggers' convention will be held here, with log rolling, log bucking and log sawing stunts.

Thursday the third annual roundup will start at the fair grounds under management of Guy Ray. Friday will be the big day, with the round-up combined with the Fourth of July celebration. In addition to the regular program of sports there will be a barbecue at the city park. The speaker of the day will be Charles A. Johns, associate justice of the supreme court of the Philippine Islands. Saturday will be given over to a pioneer and native sons' and daughters' homecoming and reunion. A program will be held in the city park.

French Medal to German Hero Resented by His Countrymen

MAYENCE, Germany. (AP).—When an Algerian soldier of the French occupation forces fell into the Rhine near Breda recently he was saved by Fritz Werner, a German, who soon afterward was decorated with a medal for bravery by the French authorities. The newspapers of unoccupied Germany have given Werner a good deal of space, and several writers suggest that he had better continue to make his home on the "other side of the Rhine," and not intrude upon the soil of Germany proper "if he knows what is good for himself."
