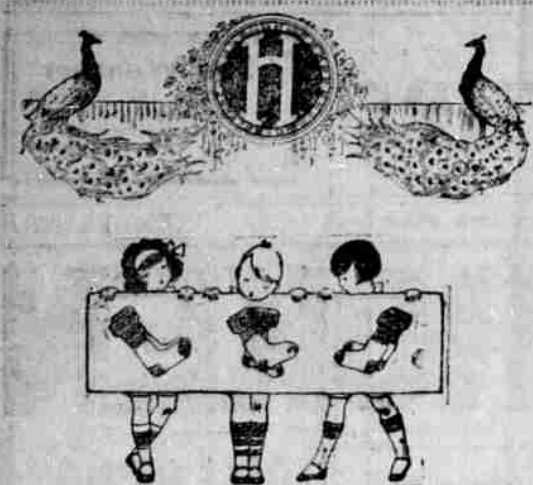

COUNTY ESSAY WINNER NAMED

The winners in Union county of the statewide essay contest, on "Pledge of Time Patriotism," being conducted by the American Legion, Department of Oregon, are announced by the County Board of Judges, as follows: First, Ella Niderer, 1811 Washington street, La Grande, grade 84 2-3 per cent; Second, Maurine Moore, 1562 1/2 M avenue, La Grande, grade 84 1-2 per cent; Margaret Creasey, 1502 Fifth street, La Grande, grade 84 per cent.

Virgil E. Walsinger, of Albee, is in the opinion of the judges, worthy of honorable mention and was given a grade of 82 per cent.

The Board of Judges for Union county was appointed by the Legion's County Americanism officer and consisted of Jno. B. Hodgkin, chairman, Carl G. Helm and Hugh E. Brady. The essays were graded on subject matter, spelling, writing and neatness.

The American Legion through its officers wishes to thank the students of the various high schools of Union county, as well as the faculty, for their co-operation in making the contest a success. There were twenty-four entrants from the county.

Miss Niderer's essay will be sent to the State Board of Judges and will be entered in competition with one from each county in the state for a cash prize of \$200 for first place, \$100 for second and \$50 for third place. If she wins one of the state prizes the two local prizes of \$12 each will go to Miss Moore and Miss Creasey. However, if she is not successful she will be awarded the prize given by Union County Vulture of the 40 and 5 Society for the best essay from Union county, and Miss Moore will be awarded the second local prize.

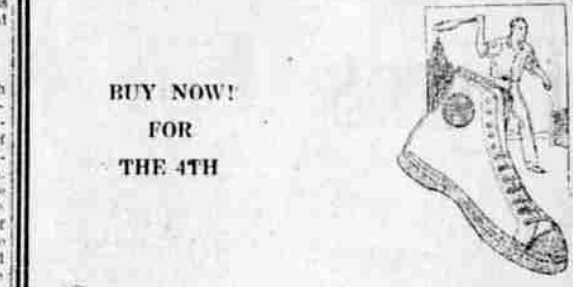
