Hints for the Housewife

SAFEGUARDING MILK

Milk is a most useful food at all times, but is never more appreciated than in summer when heavy foods pall on the appetite. Two things are essential in having good milk. The first, of course, is to be sure of the source from which the milk comes, that the cows are healthy and well cared for. The next is the care of the milk after it reaches the household. The ideal container for milk is therefore an enameled ware covered milk kettle or an enameled ware pitcher. This ware will not break and can be kept scrupulously clean with perfect ease. Care should be taken not to put milk away in an ice chest near any article of food with a strong odor, as milk absorbs smells in a most remarkable way. Where ice is hard to get, milk can be kept sweet by putting the enameled ware can in a pail of cold water, renewing the water from time to time.

PURED PEA SOUP

A milk soup is acceptable in summer when soup stock is not so easily kept on hand. When peas from the garden get too old to be eaten as a vegetable, use them in this soup. Cook the peas in cold water in an enameled ware saucepan for about 20 minutes; when soft rub them thru

ly well the business end of a plow or a governmental policy."

"He is no spavined political war-horse," they urge. "Neither is he an economical maniac. He's a sane, practical, horse-sense farmer and citizen who knows the problems and the needs of the average American. He represents the common people and he comes from the heart of the country."

Next to Davis, as a candidate aimed at the presidency but counted on to score in the vice presidential circle, is Carl Vrooman, of Bloomington, Ill.

Vrooman, 51 years old, looks more nearly 41. He's a slender erect, brown-mustached man with a bright eye and an engaging smile.

Vrooman also is urged as a "dirt farmer" candidate. He operates some 4500 acres of farm lands in Illinois and Iowa.

Unlike Davis, however, Vrooman doesn't often get between the plow handles or heave the pitchfork. Still, it's from his farms he makes his living and, as he says, when the farmers lose money he loses money.

He wears the tan of a farmer, but his bearing and general appearance make it appear rather the tan of the tennis court and the golf links than of the hay field. For he's a college man, an author-

ity on agricultural and railroad economics and when in New York lives at the Harvard Club.

More and more the delegates to the New York convention—that is, those of them from the west and south—believe now is the time for the farmers to make hay.

The agricultural vote, it is conceded, will determine the next president. A close representative of agriculture, then, either in first or second place on the ticket, may be depended on to cut a wide swath.

Anniversary of An Alphabet Celebrated by Bulgarians

SOFIA, (AP)—The Bulgarian people celebrated a unique holiday on May 24 when throughout the country was observed the "name day" of the Slavic, or Cyrillic, alphabet and of its creators, the monks of Cyril and his brother Methodius. It was in the ninth century and from the city of Salonica that these holy men promulgated their alphabet which was designed to propagate the Christian faith among Slavic peoples.

One of the notable observances took place at the Monastery of St. Ivan of Ril, in the mountains above Samokov, where the Bulgarian letters created by the apostles from Latin, Greek and Hebrew material, were preserved from extinction during the Turkish domination of five centuries.

The celebration of the day is also marked by the Orthodox church to recall the introduction of Christianity among the Bulgarian people, and its spread to the other Slavic peoples by the followers of Sts. Cyril and Methodius.

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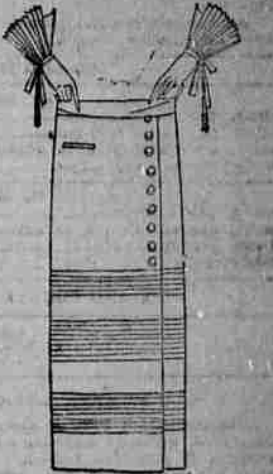

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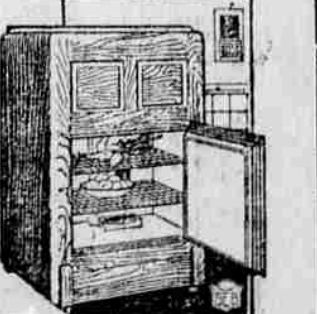
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
