Pendleton Scouts Buy Summer Camp in Hills

PENDLETON, Ore. (AP)—The Boy Scouts of this city have purchased a summer camp site in the Blue Mountains near Meacham. This tract consists of 40 acres, with over half of it cleared.

Six buildings on the ranch, when renovated, will furnish sleeping and living quarters for the boys during the summer months, while bathing facilities will be found at a distance of one-half mile in Meacham lake.

The scouts of Pendleton and of nearby towns in Umatilla county will use the summer camp.

ENGLAND TO HOLD SUDAN. LORD PARMOUR DECLARES

LONDON (AP)—The Anglo-Egypt crisis on the question of the Sudan as a British possession is taking a prominent place in both the British and Egyptian parliaments.

Lord Parmour's recent emphatic announcement in the house of lords that the government under no circumstances would abandon the Sudan, has resulted in the Egyptian prime minister, Zagloul, tendering his resignation, which, however, King Faud has refused to accept. The premier, after protracted deliberation, has agreed to continue in office.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Dates for formal notification of President Coolidge and Charles G. Dawes, republican vice presidential candidate, of their nomination by the Cleveland convention were fixed Tuesday for July 24 and 31, respectively.

Varieties and selections of wheat and other cereal crops that have been under tests on the experiment station farms are being tested before being released for commercial increase.

At the beginning of the thirty-eighth ballot William J. Bryan asked the unanimous consent of the convention to explain the vote for McAdoo, which he got and mounted the platform. "When I am through I hope you will feel that I have improved my time for the benefit of the Democratic party," Bryan began. "I have only one desire, and that is that we shall win the next election. I only desire that because I see no other hope for the nation except in a Democratic victory."

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN. New York (My the Associated Press)—The Democratic convention resumed balloting today. The thirty-first ballot showed little change from last night.

Michigan went back to Senator Parris on the thirty-third ballot.

Mississippi and Oklahoma went back to McAdoo on the thirty-fourth ballot. McAdoo people had been making a heroic effort throughout the night to bring back Mississippi and Missouri, which deserted McAdoo yesterday. Oklahoma, however, flipped back to Owen on the thirty-fifth ballot.

NEW YORK (By the Associated Press)—The Democratic national convention adjourned last night until 10:30 o'clock this morning after balloting unsuccessfully all day and throughout the evening on the nominee for president. The adjournment was taken after the thirtieth ballot, which showed no material change in the relative standing of the leading candidates.

Lieutenant Huston is an overseas veteran and went to France with the old Oregon 152d. While in France he won a commission as lieutenant. Before coming to St. Helens he resided in Portland.

GUARDSMEN NEVER MISS

ASHLAND, Ore.—"We always miss the target, but we hit the ocean every time," declared Glen Caldwell, one of the Oregon artillerymen at Fort Casey, Washington, in a letter received by Ashland friends.

According to Caldwell, the target is much too small for the national guardsmen to hit with a ten-inch gun, but to date the ocean in which the target floats, has never been missed. Caldwell says that, without exception, the guardsmen will be glad when the 17-day encampment closes in a few days.

DOMESTICATION OF THE MARTEN ACCOMPLISHED

RATHBURN, Idaho (AP)—Successful domestication of the marten, a fur bearing animal closely related to the mink, is claimed to have been accomplished by Lew Amos, a fur farmer near here who has been conducting experiments along this line for a number of years. During this spring Mr. Amos has succeeded in breeding and raising some of the animals in captivity, which he says heretofore has rarely, if ever, been accomplished.

"There have been some martens born in captivity," Mr. Amos said, "but as far as anyone knows, there have never been any bred in captivity."
